 law becomes inoperative.

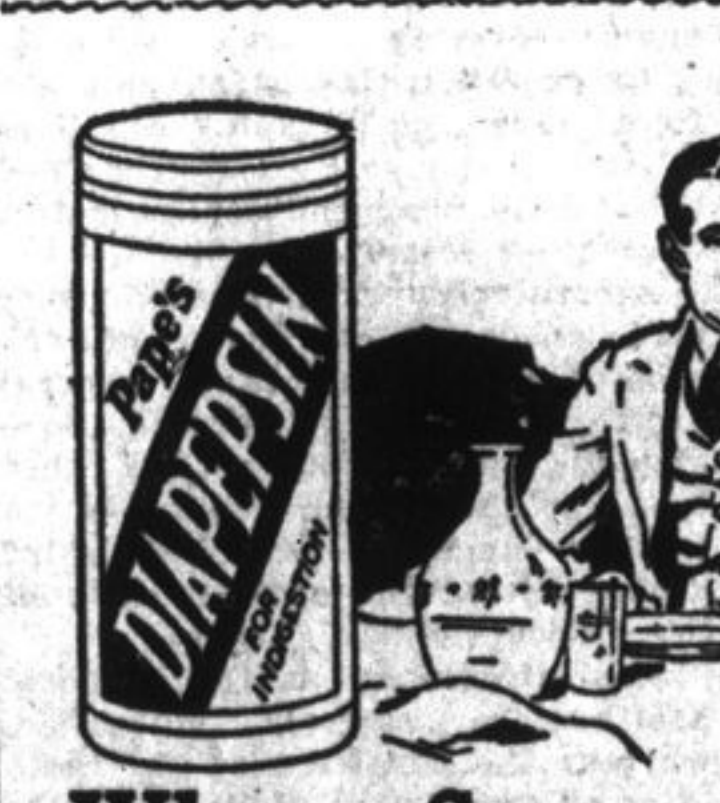
A Priest's Injury.
