Fine Offer Rejected By Bishop of Huron

London, Ont., Dec. 30.—An invitation to accept the vacant bishopric of Bangor, Wales, was recently extended to St. Rev. David Williams, D.D., Bishop of Huron, and was declined. Announcement to this effect has been made by the executive committee of the Diocese of Huron, which by resolution has expressed its appreciation of the fact that his lordship is not to leave the diocese. The importance of the Bangor bishopric is revealed by the fact that one of the duties it carries with it is the investment of the Princes of Wales when they become of age.

Market Gardener Dead.
Prescott, Dec. 30.—Alfred H. Leonard, one of the most successful market gardeners in this section, died suddenly while eating his breakfast at his home on the second concession north of Prescott. The late Mr. Leonard was born in England. He was in his seventy-eighth year and had resided here for over fifty years and was widely known. He was a member of St. John's Anglican church and in politics a Liberal. Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons and one daughter.
