inia. Verdigris: from Copper or Other Metals: This is a sort of green rust Cornmeal Mush and may be removed as follows: Wash with soda water and wipe dry. Now Coffee mix one part of sulphuric acid (poison) and 12 parts water in an earthenware vessel and apply this mixture to the metal with a small swab tied to stick. Polish with oil and rottenstone and finally with just the dry rotten-

A Reader: Kindly publish a recipe for Mexican Enchiladas:

Answer: Enchiladas: These closely resemble griddlecakes, but are made of cornmeal as follows: In Mexico the coarse commeal is used mixed to stiff dough with water, but our finer cornmeal may be substituted if it is scalded before using so that it will make a dough which can be handled without crumbling (indeed, some cooks add one part of wheat flour to three then pat it flat with the hands. Put this eake in Chile Sauce which you have brought to the boiling point and let cook till done. Now remove the cake from the hot sauce, drain, and add one tablespoon of either cooked chicken, sausage, veal or pork on it: sprinkle over with grated cheese and another tablespoon of Chile sauce, roll up, sprinkle with an onion and serve with more hot Chile sauce.
