The line of progress is not necsarly toward a medical superintendent, but towards the increasing of facilities, for the supervision of the professional visiting staff. In a teaching hospital, la superintendit may be a medical man, but in reality he cannot be a medical superintendent. He is and must be specifically excluded from the treatment of the sick. His relations to the medical staff, except perhaps in a grave emergency, are not protessional, but simply disciplinary and administrative. In these days of hones and motor cars, the posditty of emergency arising is exremely remote. If sufficient care is aken and importance allocated 'to the appointment of the senior mem her of the resident staff, all conceivble emergencies will be adequately aken care of.

As far as the second is concerned, it is very doubtful whether a medical man as superintendent will, ou the average, respond more readily to directions by the medical staff than a layman who has no opinion on strictly medical or surgical professional matters. It is true that lay superintendents may disregard or go contrary to professional direction or advice. So may medical superintendents. In both cases, it is apt to be rather the result of negligence and incompetence than of intent. The main thing is to get an administrator of education, good sense and ability who stands on his rights, but recognizes the limitations of his proper field. Ninety-five per cent. of a superintendent's duties are purely administrative without any direct reference to medical or surgical control.
