**Man Will Lose Teeth In 75,000 Years or Less**

Boston, Dec. 31.—Man will lose money, if not all, of his teeth; he will be absolutely hairless, and he will undoubtedly lose certain of his toes and fingers. These are the predictions, based on scientific study, by E. E. Raymond, Professor of Paleontology and Geology at Harvard University.

These changes will not be until man has passed through a series of evolutionary phases, which probably will consume 40,000 to 75,000 years, according to Professor Raymond. He predicted a heightening and broadening of the forehead, and an enlarging of the skull for a bigger brain, and a longer face.
