The Popularity of Chop Suey. Anybody who has ever tasted Chop Suey will understand why I am constantly receiving letters from Column Readers asking for recipes for this dainty dish. Some of these people— from a distance—happen to live near a Chinese colony or near a Chinese laundryman who will sell them some of the real Oriental ingredients such as "bamboo sprouts" and "soy" and "lotus seeds." But other folks have to use a substitute for these things so I will give both kinds of recipe: Real Chinese Pork and Veal Chop Suey: Dice one-half pound of pork and fry it in lard for four minutes. Add one and one-half pounds of diced veal and let fry five minutes longer; now add one sliced raw onion, one-half can of bamboo sprouts, one-half cup of diced celery, one tablespoon of soy sauce, ten lotus seeds and a little pepper. Cook 15 minutes gently then serve.

Real Chinese Chicken Chop Suey: With a sharp knife, cut the flesh of one entire chicken into small well-shaped pieces; fry these in grease till brown (without skin), then add one pound of mushrooms cut small, one

half can of bamboo sprouts, four stalks of celery finely diced, ten pared and sliced "water chestnuts" (another Chinese ingredient) and two onions sliced thinly. Cook all together ten minutes, then add two pounds of bean sprouts, cook five minutes more, season with a little salt and pepper and one tablespoon of soy, and serve.

Anglo-Chinese Substitute for the Real Chinese Chop Suey: Cut cold cooked chicken into small pieces and measure by cups. For every two cups set aside one cup of diced uncooked celery, one-half cup of canned mushrooms also diced, four medium-sized onions peeled and diced, one pint of consommé, one cup of cooked rice, two tablespoons of olive oil, and one-half teaspoon of salt. Begin by frying the chicken pieces till brown in the olive oil. Add the onion, the canned consommé, celery and mushrooms, and let continue to fry for perhaps ten minutes or till the onion is a light brown and tender. Stir the hot rice into the mixture (previously cooked) and add the salt. Serve hot. (Note: To make Pork or Veal Chop Suey, or a Pork-Veal mixture, simply substitute these meats for the chicken called for in this recipe.)
