Canada ships many potatoes to Britain and Cuba. Report of the killing of Trotsky is officially denied. Severe weather in north is causing serious water shortage. The Soviet government is alleged to have launched an insidious plot in Sydney, Australia against the British empire. The British note, now on the way to Washington, contains a flat repudiation of United States claims to share in the Daves pool. The League of Nations has passed the point where failure on a question imparts the league's existence, says the league official review. Hon. James M. Beck, solicitor-general of the United States, is mentioned as successor to Frank R. Kellogg, as ambassador to Great Britain. The Allied Council of Ambassadors on Wednesday approved the text of the collective note to Germany regarding the postponement of the Cologne evacuation. Adolphe Benoit, aged twenty-one, and Imogene Campbell, aged seventeen, are dead and Joseph Ryan, a soldier, was severely wounded following a New Year party fight. De-Boek, Mich.

VISCOUNT JELlicoe IS CREATED AN EARL

The List issued by the Baldwin Government Devoid of Political Complexions. London, Jan. 2.—The King's New Year's honors list was issued Wednesday evening. As usual, the honors are largely promotion of persons in the various government services at home, in India and in the colonies. It is notable that in the list more than customary attention has been paid by King George to art, science and literature. The anticipated appointment of Marquis Curzon to Kildleston to a dukedom did not materialize, but Admiral Viscount Jellicoe of Scapa was raised to an earldom. Only two persons are raised to the peerage. Sir John Bradbury, the retiring British delegate on the Reparations Commission, and Judge Sir Henry Duke having been made Barons. Most interesting to the world of learning is the appointment of two new members of the exclusive Order of Merit—Sir James George Fraser, Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge, and Sir Ernest Rutherford, Director of the Cavendish Laboratory, Cambridge University. Two women—Ellen Terry, the actress, and Mrs. Millicent Garrett Fawcett, former President of the National Union of the Women's Suffrage Society—are made Dames of the Grand Cross of the Order of the British Empire. Viscount Lee of Fareham, former First Lord of the Admiralty, is made a Knight Grand Commander of the Star of India. Included in the long list of new knighthoods are the artist, Francis Dicksee, who was recently appointed President of the Royal Academy; Edmund Gosse, author; Professor Frederick Cleveland Hopkinson, and Andrew MacFadyen, controller of German assigned revenues under the Dawes plan. There are seven Dominion and colonial knighthoods and seventeen Indian knighthoods, mainly conferred upon departmental heads or other public servants.

Quarantine at Oakland For Bubonic Plague

Oakland, Calif., Jan. 2.—The fire western waterfront here is under quarantine as the result of the discovery of a small number of rats infected with bubonic plague. Ship inspection is rigid, according to the health authorities. The City Council of Oakland and Berkeley have planned meetings to consider an addition to the federal appropriation of \$15,000 for catching the plague-ridden rats. Cause for Discussion. Toronto, Jan. 2.—In political circles there is some discussion on account of the rumored intention of the Ferguson government to increase the ministerial indemnity from \$5,000 to \$5,000 for each of the cabinet ministers. This move carries with it the purpose of increasing the sessional indemnity from \$1,000 to \$2,500 for each of the 111 members in the house. The ministers as members and representing the constituents are some in favor of the increase in the sessional indemnity as well as the cabinet increase. Flooded English towns get by boat.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—A score dead, a score hurt and more than a hundred patched up in local hospitals made up the toll of New Year's celebrations in New York. Two deaths were traced to poison liquor, one to a street brawl, and the fourth to an automobile accident that occurred during reveling. However, the celebrations failed to produce the casualties of other years.

Mrs. J. J. Gannon, who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Lynch, Whitney, Ont., and who was ninety years of age, was born in Pakenham and lived at different times in Douglas, Maynooth and the White River section of Timiskaming. At the end of 1924 the McIntyre Porcupine mine closed a record of having produced \$20,314,500 in gold since its first discovery. The mine has been developed to a depth of half a mile. The accidents of the year in Ontario, were 55,975, 402 causing death. The Compensation Board passed out \$6,132,809.26 in benefits.

COMPEN REFUSED GERMAN MILLIONS

Turned Down Offer, Refusing to Call Strikes During the War. New York, Jan. 2.—The late Samuel Compens received a verbal D.S.C. Wednesday night from H. Snowden Marshall, a United States attorney early in the world war, who in a speech before the National Civic Federation lauded the dead laborer for refusing "millions without number" to aid Germany by stopping the flow of munitions to the allies through the calling of strikes. Marshall said German agents told Compens to name his own price and that the American Federation of Labor had replied he would never take money from any other source. Women's Only Members. WIFE SETS NAGGING HUSBAND ON FIRE

She Throw Gasoline on His Coat Tail and Then Applied a Match. Chicago, Jan. 2.—Mrs. Zepora discovered a new way to dispose of a husband who complains because the blame are heavy. To still the complaints of her husband, Edward, she emptied a tin of gasoline in his direction and then touched a match to his coat tails, the police said. The effect was all that could be desired. Edward ran howling to the street, where neighbors smothered the flames with blankets. By the time the fire department arrived the flames had been extinguished and there was nothing to do but take him to the hospital. He is expected to recover.
