### CENTRAL LEAGUE MEETING AT COBourg JANUARY 13

Warning Issued to Players Arriving in Towns Since August First.

Oshawa, Jan. 2.—The officers and executive of the Central Ontario Amateur Baseball League extend the greeting that the year 1925 will be a prosperous and happy one to all baseball fans throughout Kingston and Eastern Ontario, and announces that a meeting of representatives from Kingston, Belleville, Peterboro, Cobourg, Port Hope and Oshawa will be held in the Dunham House, Cobourg, on Tuesday, Jan. 13th. The morning session will begin at ten-thirty, at which the baseball situation in these towns will be considered and organization for the coming season completed. In anticipation of a new rule in the constitution of the Ontario Baseball Amateur Association, providing that any player who has moved his place of residence since August 1st last must personally notify J. Walsh, 91 Quebec avenue, Toronto, secretary of the O.B.A.A., of such change of residence, stating the place of former residence, club last playing with and date change was made. Such notification is to be in the secretary's hands at Toronto before Feb. 1st. This must be done personally by each and every player who has come into the different towns of the league and Secretary Nott issues warning to clubs to see that same is completed and save further trouble, if said player is to play in O.B.A.A. season of 1925.

### QUEEN'S LOST AGAIN.
