Beautifully finished rest and dressing rooms for both ladies and gentlemen, a check room and refreshment counter, and special features of interest. The indirect lighting system is splendid and the alleys reported good by those who have already used them.

Extra long runways for the inexperienced bowler will be the greater appreciated when the game takes a stronger hold in Kingston. Every good bowler likes a long runway for his shot and the space back of the foul line in the Frontenac Alleys will please all.

P. J. (Paddy) Moran, of Queen's football game, one of the greatest quarterbacks ever seen in the inter-collegiate union, is the manager of the new enterprise, and his popularity will more than help it.

In the crowds which attended on opening day there were more than 150 ladies and a good percentage of these bowled and thoroughly enjoyed it. Each lady visitor during the day was presented with flowers as a souvenir.

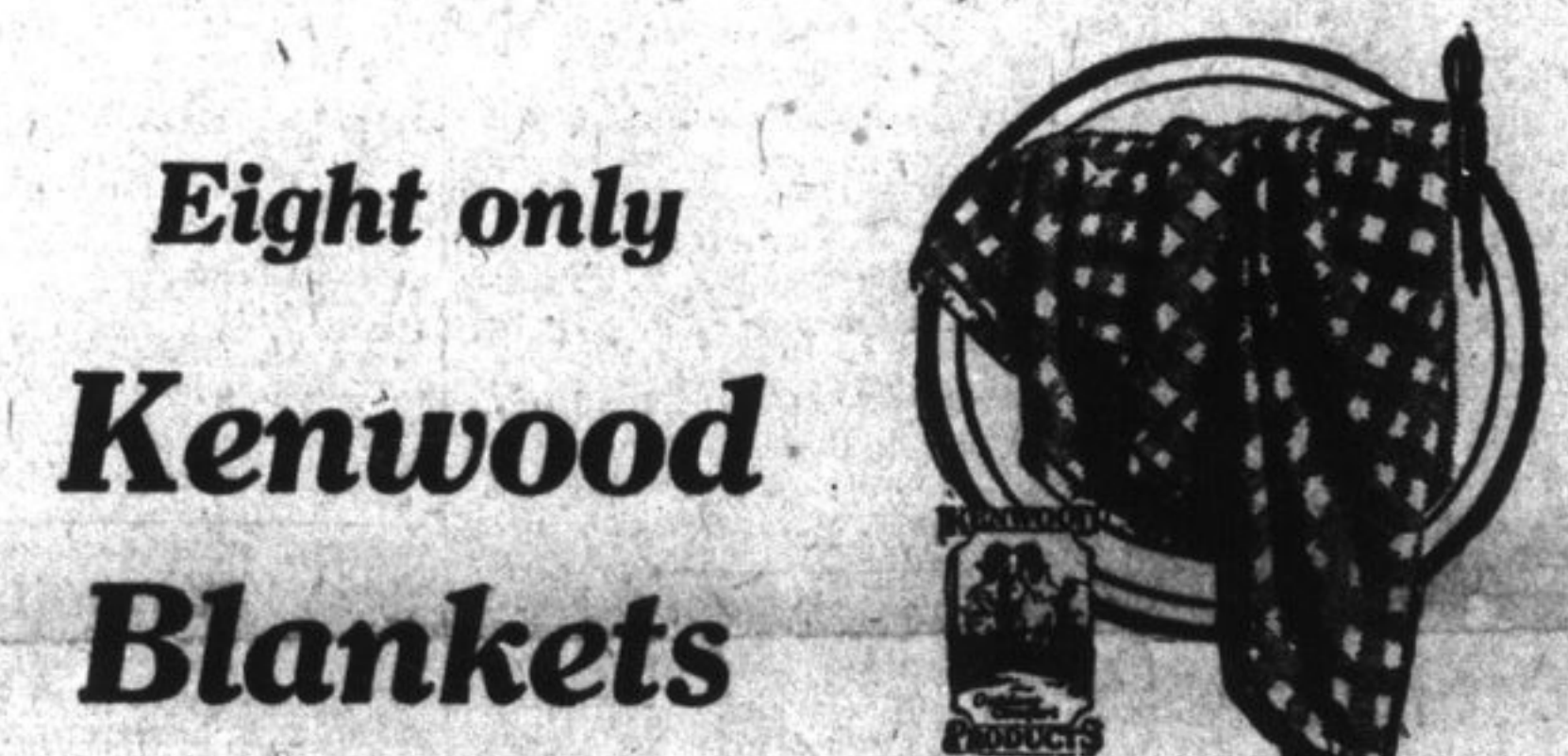
