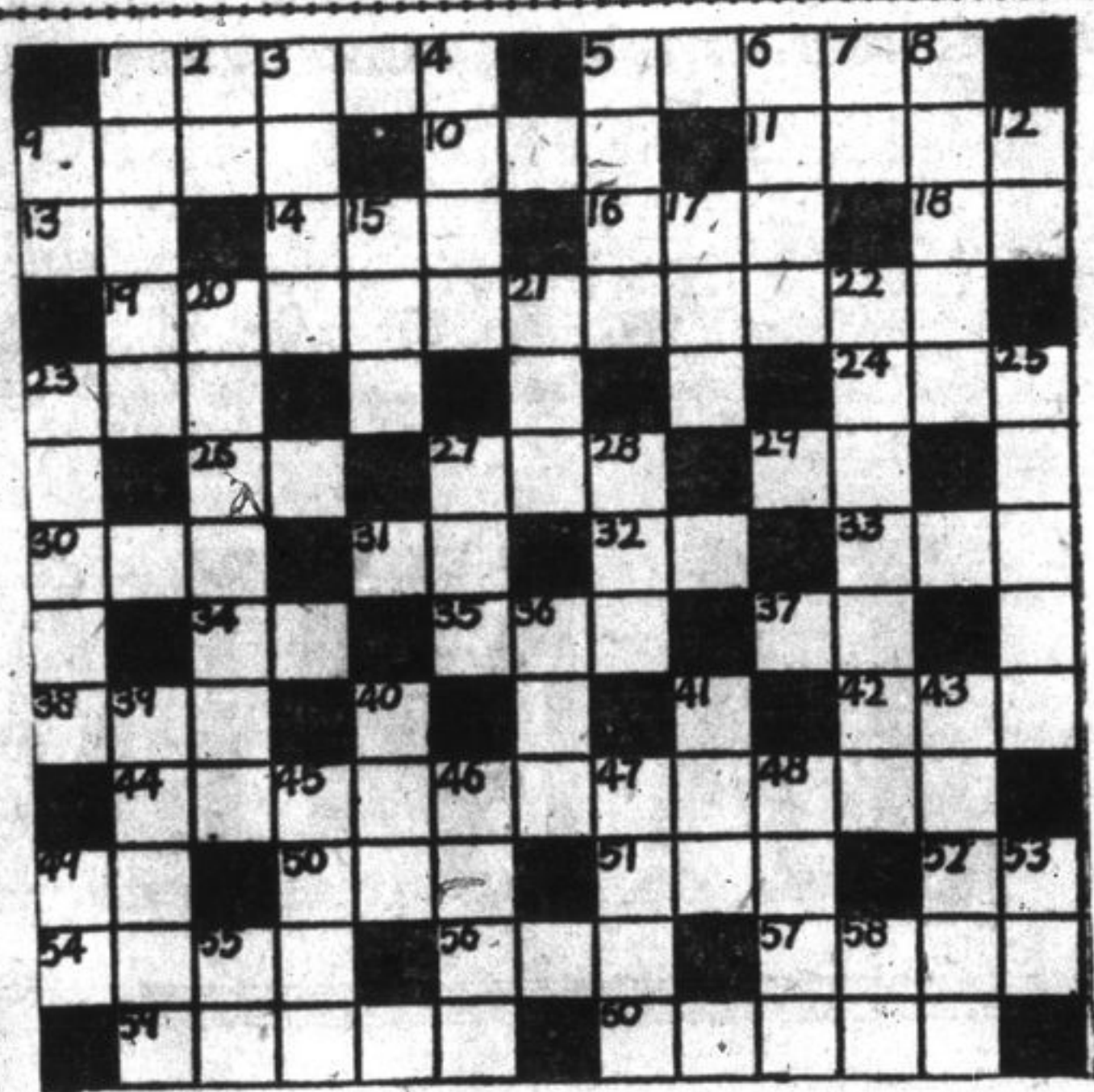

**LATE JOHN O'MARA.**

An Aged Resident of the District of York.

Early on Tuesday morning, Dec. 23rd, there passed away at his home near York, an aged and respected resident in the person of John O'Mara.
