Typing From London to New York. In the not distant future girls sitting in ordinary London business offices will be able to tick out typewritten messages in New York, more than 3,000 miles away.

This revolution in telegraph methods was forecast by Mr. Donald Murray at the Institute of Electrical Engineers.

The machine which has made this vision possible is the Startop Printer or Teletype, the business man's printing telegraph—the Ford car of telegraphy. It is provided with a typewriter keyboard which can be worked at a rate of 40 to 50 words a minute over any distance from 100 feet to 5,000 miles. Any girl typist can use it.

Mr. Murray foretold that within the next decade telegraph offices will become automatic switching exchanges similar in almost every way

to the automatic telephone exchange. Telegraph operators, like telephone girls, will disappear.

The teletype works in much the same way as the telephone, except that messages are typewritten instead of spoken.

"A subscriber," said Mr. Murray, "will be able to ring up any other subscriber, with all the usual 'engaged' and other signals, but the teletype subscriber will have an advantage that he cannot have now on the telephone trunk service. 'Every hotel and public place will

have a teletype for the delivery and reception of telegrams. There will be teletype call offices at the hotels and the great stores and other convenient centres where it will be possible to use the teletype on similar terms to the telephone and in similar circumstances, namely, payment of a sum, according to time and distance.

"The teletype can be left ready for receiving messages at night. Unlike the telephone, the teletype records messages without human assistance, and when the business man comes

to his office in the morning he will find telegrams and cablegrams that have arrived during the night or early morning."
