**QUESTION OF FUNDS IS A BIG PROBLEM**

For the Victorian Order of Nurses' Committee—Annual Meeting is Held.

On Thursday afternoon in the city council chamber the annual meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses was held with Mrs. F. C. Reid in the chair, there being a very large attendance at the meeting, which was addressed by Miss Smellie, chief superintendent of the Victorian Order for Canada.

The meeting was called to order shortly after three o'clock by the president and prayer was offered by Mrs. Boshier of the Salvation Army. After the minutes of the last annual meeting had been read, the report of the treasurer was read showing that the receipts had amounted to \$4,017.11 and the expenditures to \$3,300.31, leaving a balance of \$716.80, which Mrs. Reid remarked was one of the smallest in the history of the order.

The report of the secretary, Mrs. Campbell, was received in which it was stated that two nurses were employed by the local branch of the Victorian Order. During the past year there had been ten regular, two special and two executive meetings held and the average attendance for the meetings had been nineteen. A tea and sale was held during the year in the Y.M.C.A. rooms for the purpose of supplying certain necessary extras for the Welfare Station and a tag day had been held on June 21st, but was disappointing owing to previous tag days having been held. Mrs. L. Davidson had represented the local order at the Ottawa meeting and Miss Leeder had been present at the meeting of superintendents, held during the past year.

A Christmas treat was given to 300 mothers and their children, which was greatly appreciated by them.

An appeal had been sent out for funds to carry on the work of the order and the response from local societies in November had been highly pleasing.

The report stated that the question of finance was a big problem confronting the order. It was pointed out that the Victorian Order was a charitable organization more or less and could not be run alone on the returns that were received and it was felt that an appeal would have to be made to the city for funds to carry on the work.

In concluding her report Mrs. Campbell thanked the president for her splendid work during the past year, the doctors, press, city council and others for the help that they had rendered.

**Report of Nurse.**

The report of Miss E. Leeder, nurse-in-charge, was read and it was pointed out that the past year had been the busiest year since 1897. She gave the following figures to show for themselves how much good work had been done: Patients nursed, 306; total visits made, 1,282; visits to maternity cases, 724; visits to pre-natal cases, 211; visits to post-natal cases, 231; visits on infant welfare, 2,383; visits on social service, 653; telephone consultations, 117; visits of instruction, 11; visits to policyholders of Metropolitan Life Company, 536.

Miss Leeder's report showed that the fees from patients had amounted to \$533.50 and from the Metropolitan Company, \$297.65, making a total of \$831.15. There had been 104 confinement cases attended and the mothers advised before and after cases.

Over 200 quarts of milk had been supplied this winter to children under weight and to children of unemployed. The Rotary Club has asked the Victorian Order to take over the work of distributing their Shoes and Stocking Fund and the order has taken on this work willingly.

**Mrs. Robinson's Report.**

Mrs. Robinson's report told of the care of the child and stated that mothers were given a weight card and the babies were weighed each time they were taken to the Victorian Order station. The mothers were given advice for the care of the children as to proper clothing, food, fresh air, etc.

Mrs. Robinson's report pointed out that there had been a great increase in social service work and much help had been given to patients and milk tickets, eggs, cod liver oil, fruit, mittens, etc., had been supplied to those in need of them. A new cupboard has been placed in the Welfare Station, which is kept well filled with clothing, etc. Treats were given during the year and at Easter beautiful little baskets, trimmed with paper shamrocks, filled with Easter eggs, were presented to each child by Queen's University Anglican Girl Guides, with Miss Going as leader.

Through the kindness of Mrs. Charles Anglin, 24 pretty crepe bags were distributed, each bag being filled with candies for the little ones. Treats were given to the children by the Kingston General Hospital Alumnae, Girl Guides Committee, Sydenham street Sunday school and other Sunday schools. The report contained the information that the sewing room, now being used by eighty members of the sewing class, was overcrowded. There were 235 new babies brought to the station during the year. Invitations numbering 3,941 had been sent out during the past six years. The report mentioned Dr. H. F. Day as deserving of great credit for the

assistance he rendered during the past year. A tea given by Mrs. W. Arnel had proved a great help to the order.

**Miss Smellie's Address.**

Miss Smellie, Ottawa, the superintendent of the V.O.N. for Canada, in a brief but interesting address, stated that she had heard the reports given at the meeting, with a great deal of interest and she pointed out the fact that through them all, the increased activities had been strongly pointed out. Miss Smellie declared that the Victorian Order would need all the support it could get and the speaker advocated close co-operation with the press so that they may know the activities of the Victorian Order. Although the work had increased during the year, Miss Smellie said, she noticed that the fees were down somewhat and more money was needed to carry on the work. The fees amounted to only 40 per cent. of the income.

She pointed out the great need of co-operation between the Victorian
