NEW BELLEVILLE BREWERY.

Ministerial Association Protest Granting of License. Belleville, Jan. 8.—The Ministerial Association of Belleville has taken action and is protesting against the recent grant of a brewery license to a local firm. At a meeting yesterday it passed the following resolution:

"Whereas the enforcement of the Ontario Temperance Act is greatly hampered by the shipments of liquor, legal and illegal, from this port, and whereas the adding of another distributing agency is in utter disregard of the prohibition sentiment.

"Therefore, be it resolved, that we the Ministerial Association of the city of Belleville, hereby declare our disappointment and regret at the recent issuance of a brewery license in this city and do enter our emphatic protest against the action of the Department of Customs and Excise in this particular."

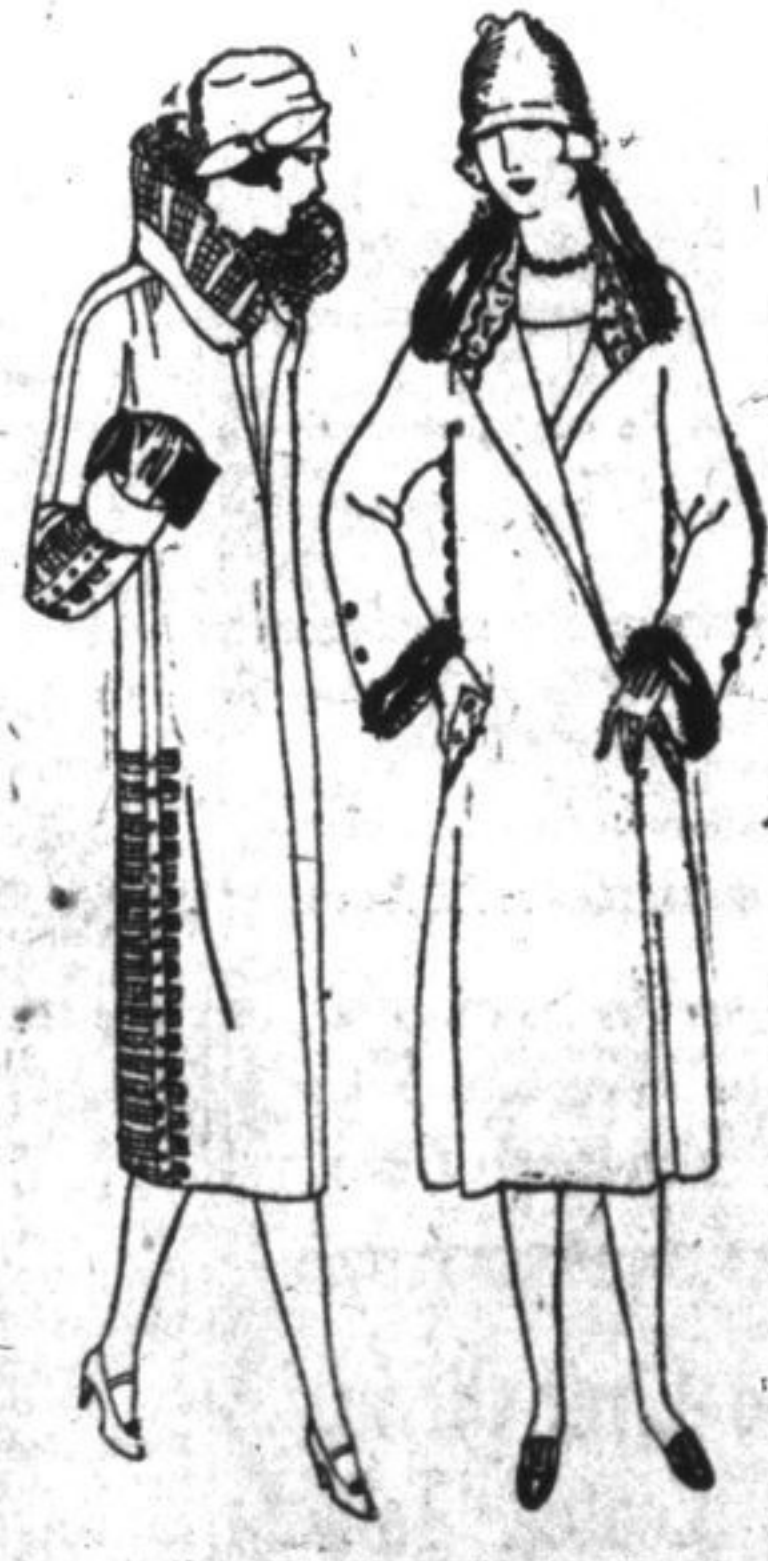
