ALD. BOYD CRITICIZED THE HORSE COMMITTEE

Claims the Team Bought for the Fire Department Are Unsound.

At the meeting of the city council on Monday night, Ald. George Boyd criticized a subcommittee of the fire and light committee, over the recent purchase of a team of horses for the fire department.

Ald. Holder, who was chairman of the committee that purchased the team, stated that the committee selected a team and then had Dr. William Nicholls, V.S., make the examination of the horses, and that Dr. Nicholls had given a certificate pronouncing the horses O.K.

Ald. Holder said he did not think the team should be such a rash statement. "And I do not want his money," he added.

Ald. Holder said he considered the team suitable for heavy drawing.

Ald. Boyd wanted to know what objection Ald. Holder had to looking at another team.

Ald. O'Connor said the fire and light committee had advertised for horses to be brought to the market square, and claimed that Ald. Boyd had headed off a good many horses that might have been brought to the city, by advocating the purchase of a certain team out in the country.

RELEASED CONVICT TO BE RE-ARRESTED

When He Reaches Niagara Falls, N.Y.—American Officers Came to Kingston.

Domino Lango, who was sentenced at Ottawa to serve a term of three years in the Portsmouth penitentiary, and who completed his sentence on Tuesday and was deported to the United States, will be re-arrested as soon as he crosses the American border at Niagara Falls, N.Y.

For about the first time in the history of the Portsmouth penitentiary, American parole officers came direct to Kingston for the purpose of making sure that they would get their man.

The American officers, when speaking to a representative of the Whig at the Frontenac hotel on Tuesday morning, stated that the convict was sentenced to serve a term in the penitentiary at Philadelphia and had been released on parole.

While serving a sentence at the Sing Sing prison, he was released on parole but soon fell in the hands of the police on the charge of forgery and was returned to that prison before he served time at Philadelphia.

The two American parole officers stated that this was their first visit to Kingston and they were pleased with the appearance of the city.
