In Opening Game of Junior O. H.A.—It Was a Splendid Exhibition of Hockey.

Circle-Six won the opening game of the junior O.H.A. local series on Monday evening when it defeated Queen's by a score of 6 to 4 at the Jock Hartly arena. The game was one of the best exhibitions of hockey seen in Kingston in some time.

The brand of hockey which was served up by both teams was of a fine order. While both teams suffered a few penalties there was no intentionally rough tactics. Hartley, the star defence player of the Circle Six got a severe cut on his arm in the first period and had to retire for repairs.

It would be a very difficult task to pick the best players on the winning team as all the boys gave the best they had. Kirby, the centre player, is without doubt a wonder. Although he only appeared among the goal getters once he was the man who passed the puck at the opportune time.

Lovett was credited with three goals and he certainly earned his spurs. He played the game for all he was worth, and was in his position when the puck was passed over in the combination plays. The Circle Six defence is a good combination. The three players, Hartley, Meltz and Joyce, seemed to have the ability to close in on the opposing players and smother the shots.

It is safe to say that Whitton was the best player on the student team. He is a freshman and certainly a "comer." He skates well and was able to carry the puck through his opponent's defence. Matheson, the Queen's goaler, was "there with the goods" all the time. Time after time he stepped in front of shots which certainly looked like counters. It was due to this wonderful work that the Circle Six boys did not run up a larger score.

Hartley and McKelvey checked well and rushed the puck the full length of the ice a number of times, but had hard luck with his shots. Baird, who paired with McKelvey on the defence, was responsible for the first score, but did not seem to be able to carry the puck and was a little off in his shooting.
