Lyons, Ordnance street, this city. Mr. Whelan passed away on Sunday, at his home, 455 Cumberland street. He was born in Quebec city, eighty-three years ago. He spent several years at Pembroke and for the last twenty-five years had made his home in Ottawa.

The late Mr. Whelan was the son of Col. John T. Whelan and Mrs. Whelan. His father was connected with the British Army, and was stationed at Quebec. As a young man he went to Pembroke and was one of the first shareholders in the Pembroke Electric Light Company and the Pembroke Southern Railway. During his residence in Pembroke, Mr. Whelan conducted a fur business.

Retiring from business, Mr. Whelan went to Ottawa. He was a member of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic parish. His wife predeceased him four years ago. In addition to Mrs. Lyons, deceased is survived by two sons, John Whelan, of Minneapolis, Wis.; Walter Whelan, of Seattle, Wash., and five daughters, Mrs. A. T. White and Miss L. Whelan, both of Ottawa; Mrs. A. H. Holt, of Aylmer, Que.; Mrs. G. H. Reilly, of San Jose, Cal.; Mrs. E. Macey Pink, Pembroke; Mr. Alexander Whelan, Aylmer, Que., is a brother. The funeral took place from his late residence on Tuesday morning to St. Joseph's church, where the funeral mass was chanted. Interment was made at St. Paul's cemetery, Aylmer.

PROBABLY THE OLDEST FRONTENAC ORANGEMAN

The Late Joseph Donaldson Was an L.O.L. Member From His Boyhood.

In the passing of Mr. Joseph Donaldson this week, Kingston has lost one of the oldest and best known residents. In his eighty-ninth year, Mr. Donaldson had spent almost all his life in Kingston and vicinity, being only thirteen years of age when he came here with his parents from Moville, Ulster, Ireland. He was the youngest son of the late William Donaldson, and the last of a large family of six sons and two daughters.

His earlier years were spent on a farm near Joyceville, Pittsburg township, county of Frontenac. Later he filled the position of toll clerk on the old Cataragui bridge and also on the Kingston market. He afterwards conducted a grocery on Ontario street, retiring from business some years ago.

He was twice married. His first wife, Sarah Todd, died while he was on his farm at Joyceville; his second, Agnes Dunlop, survives him.

He was a member of the Orange Order from earliest boyhood, being one of the founders of L.O.L. No. 709, in Pittsburg, known as the Donaldson Lodge. He was a familiar figure at every celebration and perhaps at his death ranked as the oldest Orangeman in the county.

He was a life-long Conservative and a great admirer and supporter of the late Sir John A. Macdonald in the old days.

He was a man of sterling character, staunch in his friendships, trustworthy in all his undertakings, with a cheerful smile and a kind word for all. A man with the happy art of making and keeping friends, his well-known figure and bright cheery greeting will be missed by the many who had learned to love and respect him.

His death came as a surprise to everyone as he was in his usual hearty strength up to the last and had just returned from a visit with his son at Watertown, N.Y.

The service was conducted by the Rev. J. W. Stephen, of St. Andrew's church, and was attended by a large number of friends, many of whom had known him for over half a century.

Robert Hogan, front of Yonge, died on Tuesday, aged seventy-nine years. He was born on the farm where he died. Deceased was an Anglican. Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Ernest Chant, Mallorytown, and one brother, George Hogan, in the United States. Six grandchildren also survive.
