OBITUARY

Late Mrs. Wm. Cruse, Sr.

The funeral of the late Mrs. William Cruse, who died in Toronto, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. W. Davy, was held at ten o'clock Monday morning, from the home of her son-in-law, James McIlquham, Albert street. The service was conducted by Rev. J. S. LaFlair, and Rev. Douglas Lalng.

Mrs. Cruse, whose maiden name was Harriet Crudginton, was born in England, eighty-five years ago, and came to Canada and Kingston with her husband 52 years ago, residing here continuously until fifteen years ago, when they moved to Toronto, where Mr. Cruse died about a year later.

Mrs. Cruse was a life long Baptist, and always took an active part in the work of the local organization during her long residence in Kingston. Failing health had interfered with her ability to attend church during recent years, but she retained a lively interest in spiritual things to the last. Her quiet kindly Christian character was a benediction in her home, and a real force for good in the community.

Surviving her are a sister, Mrs. John Litton, Sr., of Kingston, and three sons, and four daughters, William of Winnipeg, John and James of Kingston, Mrs. James McIlquham and Mrs. W. J. Clark of Kingston, and Mrs. H. W. Davy and Mrs. N. G. VanDyke of Toronto.

Mrs. Mary Armstrong, wife of Police Sergeant Marshall Armstrong, died at her home, 417 Johnson street early Sunday morning after a brief illness. Deceased was very well known in the city and the news of her death was received with great regret by her many friends. She was a Methodist in religion and a member of Queen street church. She is survived by her husband and four daughters, Dorothy, Helen, Alma and Margaret, and one son, John. The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon at Catawauqui cemetery. Rev.
