# PLACES OF PREACHING

# Will Number 9,000---There Will Be 3,000 Clergymen and 630 Missionaries.

Toronto, Jan. 29 .- The United Church of Canada will have more than 700,000 . communicant members on the consummation of the union of Methodist Presbyterian and Congregational denominations, after June 10th next, after making all allowances for all probable concurrent churches with members who will remain with tha continuing Presbyterian Church. This estimate has been made by the officials of the Church Union committee, which also is responsible for the statement that there will be anproximately 9,000 churches and preaching places in the United Church, to be ministered unto by 3,000 clergymen and 630 mission-

According to the act, the consummation is to take place "in the city of Toronto at such place and at such hour as may be agreed upon by the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the general superintendent of the Methodist Church and the chairman of the Congrega tional Union of Canada." The date has not yet been fixed.

Already committees are at work on the local arrangements for the first great general council of the United Church. Billeting of delegates, rules of order and forms of procedure, the docket of business and order or service, are being planned. There is to be a series meetings of consecration and inspiration. All the Canadian prov-
