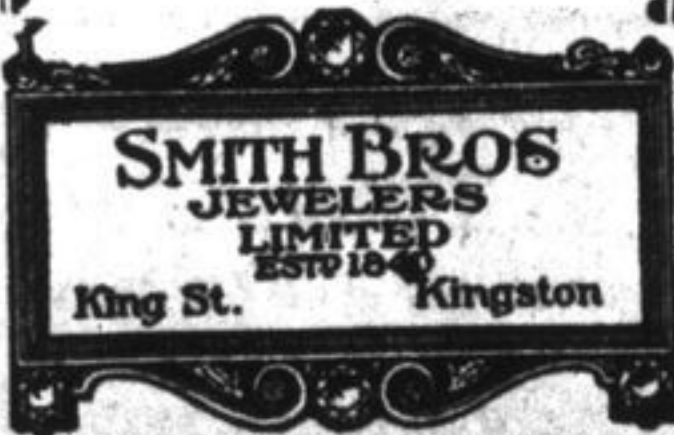

Gipsy Smith wrote an article in a recent London periodical, part of which is reprinted here:

"I certainly think people have much more liberty than they used to have, even if the morals are no worse. If they are not, I thank God; but I am not sure that they are not worse."

"Men and women, both young and old, do things in public that they don't do in private life, and yet one would have thought that what the do in public they would even do with greater liberty in private. Things happen now that did not happen before the war."

**Leave Women Set Standards.**

"We are setting the standard for to-morrow and if I had the ear of every woman in the world I would like to say that the morals of the men are no higher and no worse than they allow. If the women of the nation were only loyal to one another and loyal to God and the best traditions of their mothers, they could draw a chalk ring round themselves—each one of them—and no man would dare to think of putting his foot over the ring, and would not do so until she gave him permission."

"The men are what the women allow them to be, and no more than they demand. It is the woman who sets the two standards of the morals of the race, because she allows to man what she does not allow to women. If a woman steps down and knows it and loses her purity she is discarded even by the woman who has not lost hers, but she has not been exposed."

**Permit Sin.**

"If the thing we call man who has robbed a girl of her purity and ruined her, can dress well and drive an expensive automobile, we allow him to come back and dance with our daughters, sit in our drawing rooms and play cards with us. And the women, knowing his past history, regard him in the light of one who has 'sown his wild oats.' Yet she kicks his victim into the gutter."

"I wonder who could entertain the very thought of Mary, the mother of our Lord, sitting and smoking or dancing in cabarets and attending night clubs, giving her baby a dose of something—whisky or worse—to keep it happy whilst she is out all hours of the night with a Goddess crowd? What would have become of the baby? Nobody would think of Mary doing these things, and she was only a woman."

"We should remember that im-

pressions are made on boys and girls by their mothers. "If anyone asks me to-day what England needs most of all, I should say, 'She needs Godly mothers.'"

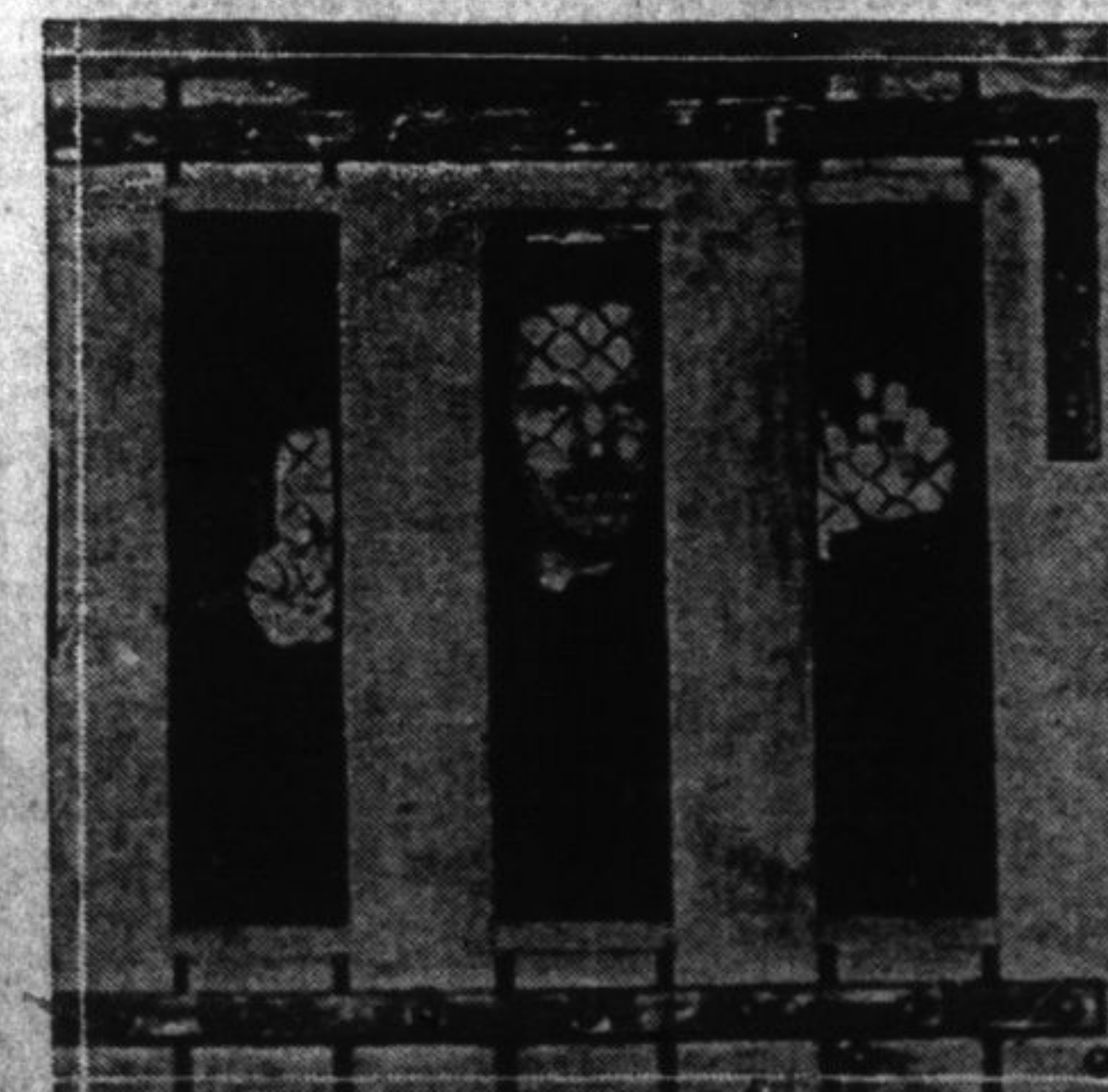

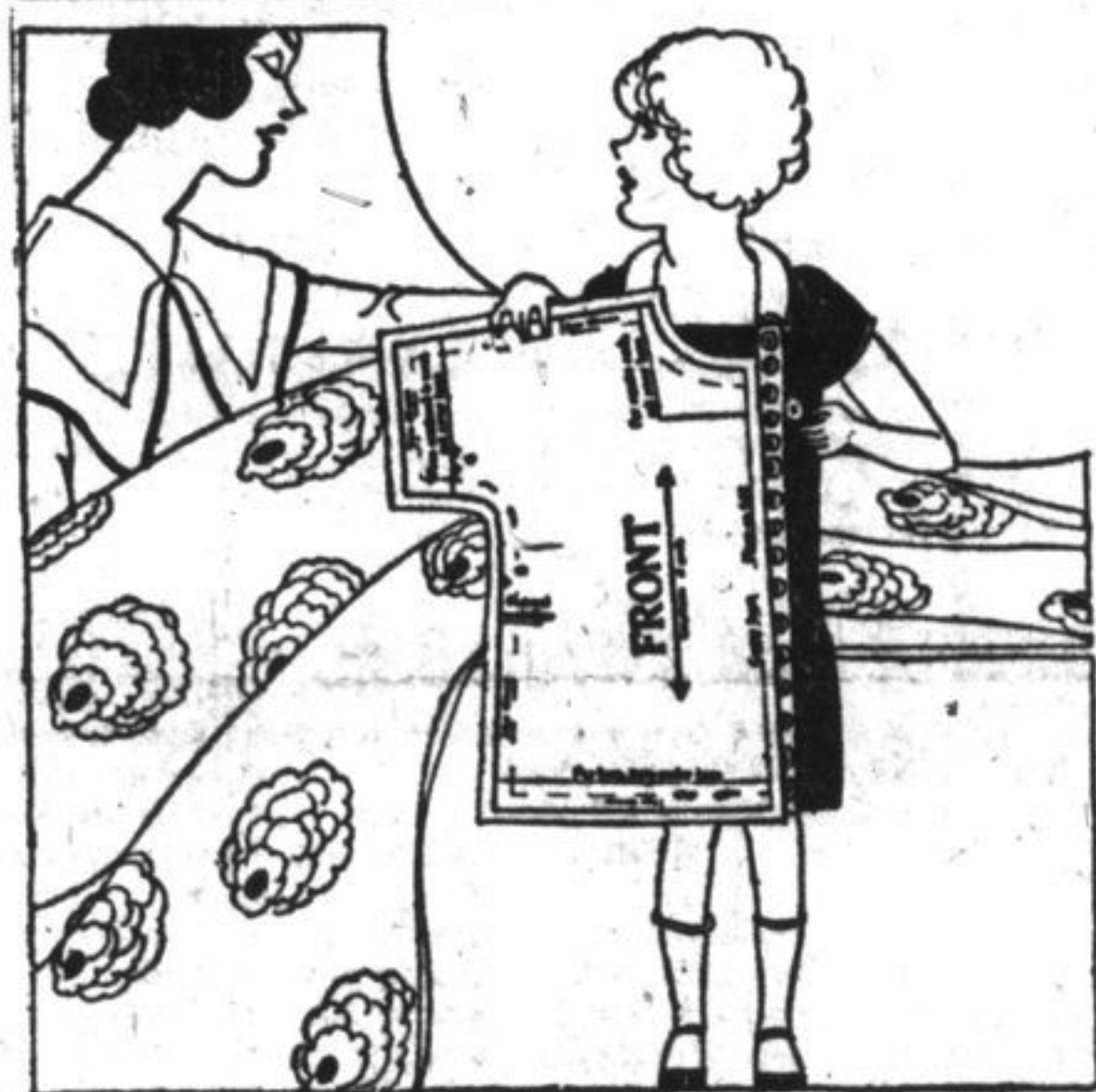
