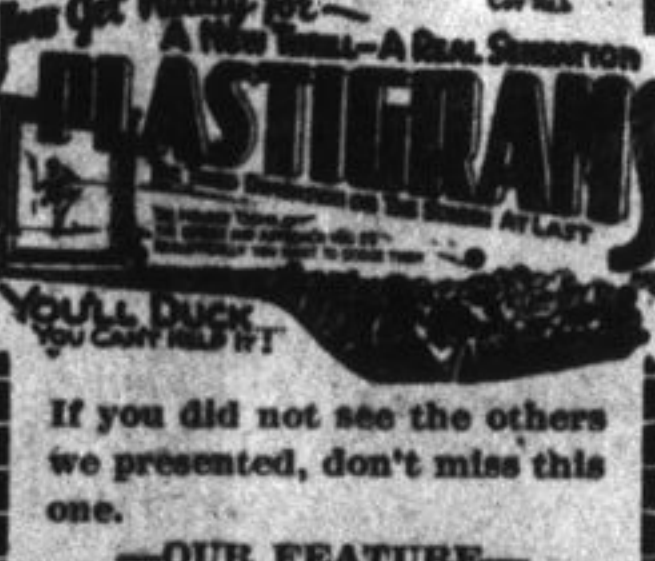

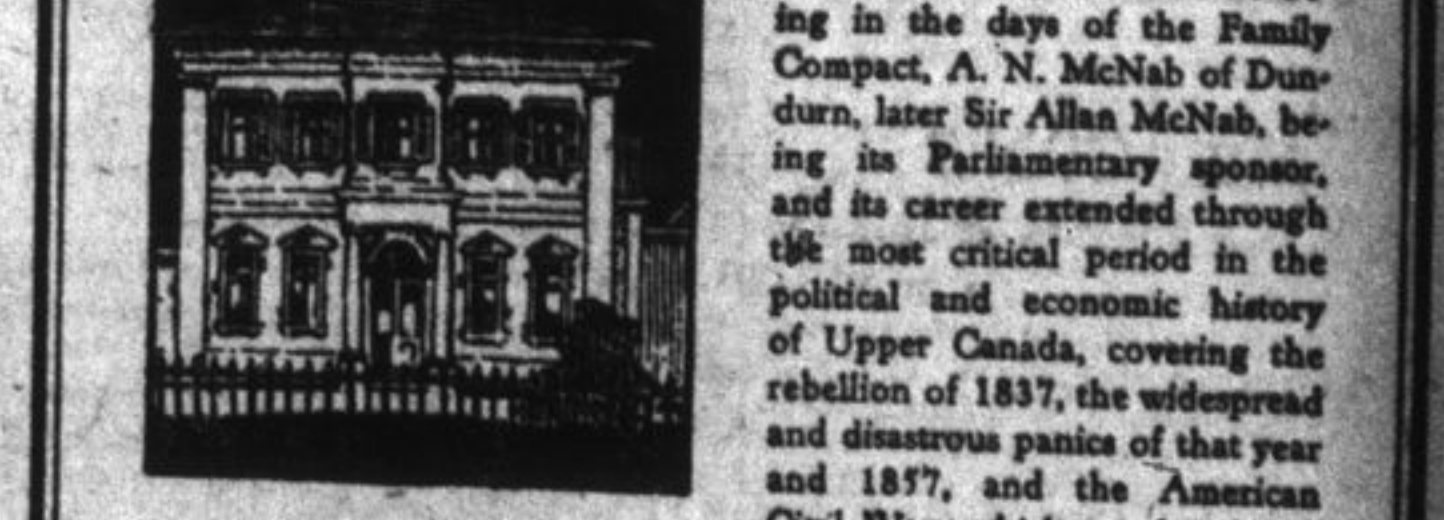

A Chapter in the Story of a Canadian Banking Family

FOR 34 years, from its establishment in 1836 to its absorption in 1870 by The Canadian Bank of Commerce, the Gore Bank virtually led the industrial development of Hamilton and the old Gore District.

NO FORWARD PASS IN THE CANADIAN GAME. Rules Commission of Intercollegiate Union Decided at Montreal Meeting.

McGill University of Montreal and Loyola College were solid for the adoption of a modified form of the forward pass in accordance with a set of rules governing such play as presented by the special committee appointed some time ago for this purpose.

McGill had been anticipated that a modified form of the forward pass would be rendered legal for this year and that the penalties would be altered, but while there was a majority in favor of the changes, the two-thirds majority vote was not obtained.

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UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF TO BE GIVEN CITIES

Province to Bear One-third of Excess Cost Over Normal of Works.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—The Ferguson cabinet announced over the weekend a programme of unemployment relief to be extended to Ontario cities. One-third of the excess cost over normal of municipal works and of relief is to be shouldered by the province as its share in alleviating conditions of striking necessity.

In announcing this policy, Premier Ferguson made it plain that his government was not accepting any theory of provincial responsibility for unemployment, but was simply acting because of its inability to overlook the distress which exists through no fault of the people but because of the stagnation of industry.

The announcement of the Government followed the appeal made last week by a large deputation representative of all Ontario municipalities, which declared the unemployment problem to be one of human urgency, beyond the ability of municipalities to meet.

Consideration has now been given to the appeal by the cabinet, and the following statement by Premier Ferguson details the policy which is being adopted.

Ontario Legislature to Open on Tuesday

No Hazard Made as to Proposed Amendments of "Wets" to O.T.A.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—There is unusual activity at Queen's Park today in preparation for the opening of the second session of the sixteenth legislature tomorrow. Many members from remote constituencies have already arrived. There has been no announcement as to what legislation may be expected in the speech from the throne.

Those already predicted in this column as a rumor around the buildings that the speech will mention the branch extension of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway into the new mining district of Rouyn. There is a report that the government may go ahead with the immediate construction of this line. It is generally agreed that the temperance issue will be a live one, but none will hazard even a guess as to what form the proposed amendments by the "wets" will take.
