RAIN AN OBSTACLE TO WORK OF RESCUE

Shaft Through Hill Is Only Half Way to Where Collins is imprisoned.

Cave City, Feb. 9 .- Mother nature today had another obstacle to the efforts of men to rescue Floyd Collins from the grip of the boulder trap in the depths of Sand Cave, sending torrents of rain jast night with a promise of more today. Despite precautions to keep the water out of the perpendicular shaft aimed at Collins' prison, the seepage crept into the bottom of the shaft and added heavily to the burden of the volunteer diggers. They kept doggedly at it as the tenth day of Colo'clock this morning. The was then less than half way to Colling, 60 or 70 feet below the surface.

The shaft through which the rescuers hope to reach Collins was approximately 30 feet deep at nine o'clock this morning, four days after it was started. At the present rate the level where Collins is thought to be will not be reached before Thursday or Friday.
