The question of having this diversion reduced had been a long standing one and the question was still being argued. Mr. King stated that this Chicago diversion was taking care of the sewerage disposal three and a half million people and added to this was the industrial re fuse, which brought the figure to about four and a half million.

In 1890 the sanitary district was organized, consisting of fifty cities and villages around Chicago. This of course drew from the Great Lakes system and ran through Desplaines river and on to the Gulf of Mexico and the flow has been getting more and more until it has reached 10,-000 cubic feet per second. This flow, which runs to Lockport can carry the biggest lake ship, so an idea of how much water is being diverted can be gained from this.
