ADDRESS ON CHICAGO WATER DIVERSION

Given by Mr. Francis King, K.C., Before the Kiwanis Club on Monday.

One of the finest addresses delivered before the Kiwanis Club in a long time was that by Mr. Francis King, K.C., who spoke to the members Monday on the Chicago water diversion and, though his talk was quite short, it proved highly interesting and contained valuable information. Mr. King showed a thorough knowledge of his subject and imparted his message in a clear and concise manner.

Mr. King drew a picture of what would have happened in the old days in Egypt had some tribe or other diverted the flow of the Nile in a different direction from its natural course to use the water for their own selfish purposes, and he pointed out what a great deal of trouble would have occurred had this taken place. Pharaoh would certainly have made things lively had such a thing occurred. The speaker drew a comparison of such a thing with the Chicago drainage system which is at the present time occupying the attention of United States and Canada.

Mr. King drew attention to the fact that millions of dollars had been spent in the Great Lakes waterway, and it was now one of the most magnificent in the world. It had been developed at a tremendous cost, the water had been brought to a proper depth, docks had been placed at right height, unloading plants had been erected along the route and channels had been dug. It was almost impossible to give the cost of the work that had been done. The Welland canal alone will cost millions of dollars.

With this great amount of money expended, the speaker pointed out that here was Chicago diverting 10,000 cubic feet of water per second from the flow and running it out through the Desplaines river to the Illinois river to the Mississippi river and to the Gulf of Mexico, instead of having it flow down the regular Great Lakes waterway. Mr. King brought it home to his audience just what this meant. It meant that six inches of water would be taken off the water in the Great Lakes and would mean a very grave handicap to Great Lakes navigation. He figured that it would be the loss of one entire trip on the lakes in the season and this meant a tremendous loss.

The question of having this diversion reduced had been a long standing one and the question was still being argued. Mr. King stated that this Chicago diversion was taking care of the sewage disposal of three and a half million people and added to this was the industrial refuse, which brought the figure up to about four and a half million. In 1890 the sanitary district was organized, consisting of fifty cities and villages around Chicago. This system of courses drew from the Great Lakes system and ran through Desplaines river and on to the Gulf of Mexico and the flow has been getting more and more until it has reached 10,000 cubic feet per second. This flow, which runs to Lockport can carry the biggest lake ship, so an idea of how much water is being diverted can be gained from this.

Mr. King pointed out the great danger of this new water system in contrast to the Great Lakes. The United States was having its own time over it, and Canada could only protest against it. The speaker felt sure that favorable action would be taken in due time. Engineers had pointed out that 1,000 cubic feet per second was sufficient to take care of the Chicago sewage system, and he felt that congress would gradually reduce the diversion very materially.

Mr. King was tendered a very hearty vote of thanks on motion of Kiwanian Ambrose Shea, the motion being seconded by Kiwanian J. M. Campbell.

Mr. W. H. Herrington, a young lawyer, was introduced as a new member of the club by Kiwanian Melkijohn and he was enthusiastically received.

THE PYKE COMPANY TO RAISE THE KENDALL

Which Sunk in an Ice Jam at Prescott on 2nd of February.

The steamer Harvey J. Kendall of the George Hall Coal Co. of Ogdensburg, sunk by the ice jam at Prescott, is to be raised by the Pyke Towing & Salvage Co. of Kingston. In the severe weather of February 2nd the Kendall, coal carrier of seven hundred tons capacity, while endeavoring to keep the channel clear between Prescott and Ogdensburg, was stove in and sunk by the ice in twenty-two feet of water, sinking so rapidly the crew had barely time to get away.

The contract to raise the Kendall has just been given to the Pyke Company. The pumps and other salvage outfit will be shipped by rail and together with the wrecking crew will leave at once. Captain Pyke expects that it will take at least ten days to raise the steamer as she is in a very bad position.

DEMAND PAYMENT IN FULL.
Defrauded Farmers Refuse to Accept 50 Cents on Dollar.
Peterboro, Feb. 10.—Defrauded farmers demand one hundred cents on the dollar for live stock they sold to R. Sherman and Nathan Merson, now on \$11,000 bail. Montreal relatives of the accused offered a compromise restitution of fifty cents on the dollar for some \$4,500 worth worthless cheques obtained in goods from farmers of Peterboro, Victoria and North Northumberland Counties.

WILL GET OPINION OF THE CITY SOLICITOR

As to Right of Utilities to Charge Property Owners For Tenants' Service.
