



Snaring Foxes. Bolingbrooke, Feb. 6 .- (To the Editor): I would like to ask permission to write a few lines in your paper concerning snaring fox. think it is a curse just as bad as poison. They not only catch foxes and dogs, but rabbits by the hundreds, which are left in the swamp to rot, also as inducement for dogs. These rabbits, some say, are good to eat. If so, that is violating the law, as no animal suitable for food shall be let go to waste.

Mr. Shaw says in his letter that some parties have united their efforts in the form of a petition to stop him from catching fox, etc., which is not true. It is true that there has been a petition signed but it is not meant for any special individual, and is for no other purpose than to prohibit enares. Mr. Shaw also says that most of the people who signed the petition are men who hunt without license and on the Lord's Day, which is not true. I don't believe there are three who hunt at all. They are just farmers who don't believe it is right to snare. Anyone reading Mr. Shaw's letter would think he never violated the law.

Mr. Shaw says he has caught a few dogs and thinks if he loses a fox or two that is punishment enough. That is poor pay for the owner whose dog is worth maybe \$50.
