DEATH OF CAPT. HOADLEY.

He Handled Several Crafts on the St. Lawrence. Captain John Hoadley, Alexandria Bay, aged sixty-eight, one of the oldest boat captains on the river, died Thursday, after a long illness.

Captain Hoadley was born in the village, Nov. 19th, 1837, and had lived in that vicinity all his life. While a young man he operated a boat shop and for many years built boats.

Later he became a pilot and finally built the Ione, a steamship, which he chartered out. He did not run a regular passenger service, depending more on cruises for private parties, for his work.

His patronage grew to such an extent that he later rebuilt the Ione, providing room for more passengers and he then renamed the vessel the I Wonder. He retired several years ago because of his age.

Mrs. Hoadley died several years ago. Captain Hoadley is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Frank Lee and Mrs. Abner Swan, both of Alexandria Bay; two sons, Charles, Alexandria Bay, and John, of Canada. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Sophia Wood, Kingston.

Rev. C. N. Dewey died at Tilsonburg, Ont., aged 65 years. He was born at Picton. Deceased was a Baptist. At one time lived at Delta.
