KU KLUX KLAN IS ACTIVE IN ONTARIO Granted Registration in Toronto—Also Hidden Knights of Midnight Sun. Toronto, Feb. 17.—Acting on behalf of C. Raymond Larson, engineer, and Carlton B. McGowan, operator, J. R. Code, a local barrister, has applied to the city registry office for and has been granted registration of two fraternal societies, one known as the Invisible Empire Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of the Dominion of Canada, and the other the Hidden Knights of the Midnight Sun of the Dominion of Canada.
