ALBERT L. CLOUGH Tricks Of Jack Frost

He Has Many Ways Of Bothering The Motoriet

LEAVING A CAR with its wheels deeply imbedded in slush, when the weather is rapidly growing colder, often causes trouble. As the soft slush hardens into ice over the tires and rims, the car becomes frozen in and it sometimes proves very difficult to free it. If this happens and the car fails to start, when the clutch is let in on low gear do not race the engine and jam in the clutch violently-straining all parts unduly-but try reverse and low gear alternately and see if the ice will not let go. Taking hold of the tops of the wheels and shaking the car back and forth sideways sometimes helps to break the jos

Freeing The French-In Car Rather than abuse mechanical parts by forcing a car to extricate itself, it is better, in extreme cases of freezing in, to get a crowbar or axe and chip out the ice which is holding the wheels. A car that has been splashing through slush or puddles and then is left standing with the weather getting colder, may fail to start away readily. because water has collected on its external brake bands and brake drams and frozen them together. Applying engine power alternately on forward and reverse speeds will generally break the ice, but in extreme instances a long screwdriver, used as a pry at several points between the bands and the drums, has to be resorted to to free these

Ice In The Puel-Line

When an engine persistently refuses to start or starts and almost immediately stops and cannot be made to re-start, this may be due to freezing of water in the fuel system. If there is plenty of gasoline in the main tank and still none will drip from the carburetor, when the priming-pin is operated, most likely there is los in the system somewhere. The free use of hot water on the carbureter, vacuumtank and fuel piping will generally effect thawing, when the water should be drained out immediately, but in the absence of hot water, denstured alcohol poured into the carburetor bowl and vacuum-tank will usually melt the ice.


