NAVY LEAGUE NIGHT Y.M.C.A. HOLDS CIRCUS

Address by General Lessard,
Who Inspected the Local
Sea Cadets.

On Monday evening about two hundred citizens, who are interested in the work which is being carried on by the local branch of the Navy League of Canada, gathered at the Catholic Assembly hall, Wellington street, and had the pleasure of listening to a very interesting and instructive address by Major-General Lessard. Clowns, acrobats, black-face artists and brazen show "girls" thronged the halls and made a gala night of it in the old institution.

Like all good circuses the programme started with a grand parade, performers, clowns, animals and all. One of the best numbers of the evening followed immediately. It was a fine tumbling act by C. O. Chamberlain, the physical director, together with F. Sanders, J. Blake, G. Thompson, and V. Coe. They showed surprising agility and strength and the work of two or three won particular applause.

A tragedy succeeded when the clowns found it necessary to operate on a sufferer. The realism of the performance could hardly have been exceeded and the growth which was removed would have pleased any resident of Frankfurt. The patient is believed to be doing as well as could be expected.

A drill by the Junior B group, showed the thoroughness of the training which is being given regularly in the less showy part of gymnasium work, by which young bodies are built up in strength and symmetry.

The Junior employed group then showed what they could do diving and tiger-leaping. Considering the short run their work was remarkable and drew much applause. Bill Coffee and Earl Waterman then solved a few cross-word puzzles and several other problems besides.

The parallel bar foam consisting of the Sanders brothers and G. Thompson put on an exhibition which has seldom been equalled for finish, variety, and difficulty. It was a pleasure to watch the ease with which these boys accomplished the difficult tasks they set themselves. The clowns then showed a stranger the milky way in a way that left him rather milky and then the Junior A group gave a finished exhibition of pyramid building that brought the excellent programme to a close.

During the intermissions and at the conclusion the Y.M.C.A. orchestra gave selections. Mr. William Keating as ringmaster, with stove-pipe hat, cracking whip and fund of jokes filled a necessary part of the programme satisfactorily. Very dashing boys sold portable refreshments. Despite their attire they were addressed as Miss Chadwick and Miss Osborne.

At the conclusion of the main performance the side-shows did a rushing trade. In the auditorium the Royalite Concert Party did their stuff in a manner that sent all home highly pleased; and for the mystically inclined there were gypsies who could see the past, present and future with unerring skill. The Misses Truesdale, Lytle, and Sinclair, representative of the Ladies' Gym Class, attended to this agreeable feature.

Great credit is due to Mr. W. Muselman, chairman of the physical work committee, who not only supervised the general arrangements but placed the admirable decorations of red and white streamers and flowers all about the gymnasium. To Mr. C. O. Chamberlain, the physical director, the greatest praise is due for the finish and variety of this successful exhibition which, in a financial and every other way, attained its objective.

SIX MONTHS ADDED.

To the Sentences of Two Convicts Who Escaped.

Frank Grice and John Westenhaver, two convicts who are serving time at the Portsmouth penitentiary, and who made their sensational escape from the snow shovelling gang on Saturday, January 3rd, appeared before County Magistrate J. W. Bradshaw on Monday afternoon and had six months added to their sentences. The men had intended to go before judge and jury, but they changed their minds and appeared before Magistrate Bradshaw, pleaded guilty to the charge and had six months added to their sentences.

The men will have to finish their original sentence and then serve the additional sentence. Grice was sentenced at Hamilton and Westenhaver was sent down from Kitchener.

Giovanni de Francisco, who was serving a fifteen year sentence and had broken his parole after being released a short time ago, and was brought back to the prison, will now have to serve the remaining nine years of his sentence.

Late Simon J. Smith.
In Chicago on Feb. 8th, there passed away a former resident of Frontenac County, in the person of Simon J. Smith, eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Smith, Sunbury, Ont., in his sixty-eighth year. The late Mr. Smith went to Chicago when a young man, and secured employment with the firm of Writtenhouse and Embridge, lumber manufacturers, with which firm he remained until about six years ago, and then owing to poor health was pensioned off by his employers.

Shortly after Christmas, his two brothers, Charles, of Alvington avenue, this city, and Cornelius, of Sunbury, made a trip to Chicago for a visit with their brother, and while they found him in poor health, did not anticipate such a speedy end, as his last sickness lasted but a day or two before his death.

Chicago; two daughters, Mrs. Lyle Laird and Mrs. A. W. Fischer, Chicago, and three sisters, Mrs. Robert Agnew, Chicago, Mrs. W. J. Brown, Toronto, and Mrs. E. J. Marshall, Kingston.

The funeral was held under the auspices of the Masonic order, of which the late Mr. Smith was a life-long member.
