**EVERYBODY WONDERS HOW "DOUG" DID IT**  
 It is evident that when Douglas Fairbanks produced "The Thief of Bagdad," which will be on view at the Capitol Theatre today, Friday and Saturday, he had in mind to make the apparently impossible an accomplished fact. In every city where this picture has been shown the same strain has been: "I wonder this or that."  
 When the redoubtable Doug clambers up a rope that is suspended in thin air, one begins to take notice; then he dives to the bottom of the water, kills an undersea monster, and when his subterranean business is finished, he calmly propels himself to the surface.  
 He enters an enchanted wood, where a tall tree, at the wave of a hand, comes to life and walks about with uncanny dexterity to all accepted ideas of tree conduct.  
 Later in the picture, the Thief climbs a flight of a Thousand Steps that leads to the clouds and mounts a beautiful Winged Horse that gracefully flies away with Doug on his back. By now, you are ready to believe that anything is possible and when as a climax, you see Douglas and the Princess step upon a Magic Carpet, it seems quite proper for the rug of its own volition to rise up, sail out of the window, circle the house-tops of Bagdad amidst the plaudits of the multitude, and disappear with the human freight across the rising moon.  
 The magic introduced into this film is so unusual that it would seem likely to be the dominating interest, but very wisely Douglas keeps everything subservient to the story, and the beautiful romance of the Thief and the Princess is both compelling and dramatic, with a well-balanced admixture of thrills and surprises.  
 On Saturday morning a special show will be put on for school children at ten o'clock, the admission being fifteen cents.

 Brampton, Feb. 19.—In the fastest game of the season, locally, Brampton, on Wednesday night, defeated Uxbridge in the third round of the intermediate O.H.A. playoffs by a 1-0 score. Both teams did plenty of back-checking in the first twenty minutes of the game and open play did not start until the second frame. By the end of the second period both teams were going at a terrific pace. In the second period, about half-way through, MacNeil, of Brampton, scored the only counter of the game, shooting from fairly close in. Both Baiton and Core, rival goal-tenders, played remarkable hockey and in the last period, Core played a stonewall game against the steady rain of shots that were sent at him.

**LIEUT.-COL. H. W. CLINCH AN R.M.O. GRADUATE**

Killed at a Hunt of the Hounds in England—A Native of Rothesay, N.B.  
 Lieut.-Col. H. W. Clinch was killed at a hunt of the Grafton hounds at Preston Capes, in Northamptonshire, England, on Monday. Mrs. Clinch only returned from the Dominion to England last week.

Lieut.-Col. Clinch, who was born in Rothesay, N.B., in 1871, and attended the Collegiate Institute there. He entered the Royal Military College, Kingston, in 1888, and graduated in 1892, taking out a commission in the Infantry of the Imperial Army. He served through the South African war, winning the Queen's medal with four clasps and the King's medal with two clasps. Later, he transferred to the Army Service Corps and finally to the King's Dragon Guards.

On the outbreak of the war in 1914, he proceeded overseas with the original British Expeditionary Force, and was wounded. He was mentioned in despatches in 1917 and received the Mons Star, the General Service Medal and the Victory Medal. He retired from the service at the close of the war with the rank of Lieut.-Colonel and settled down in Folkestone, England.

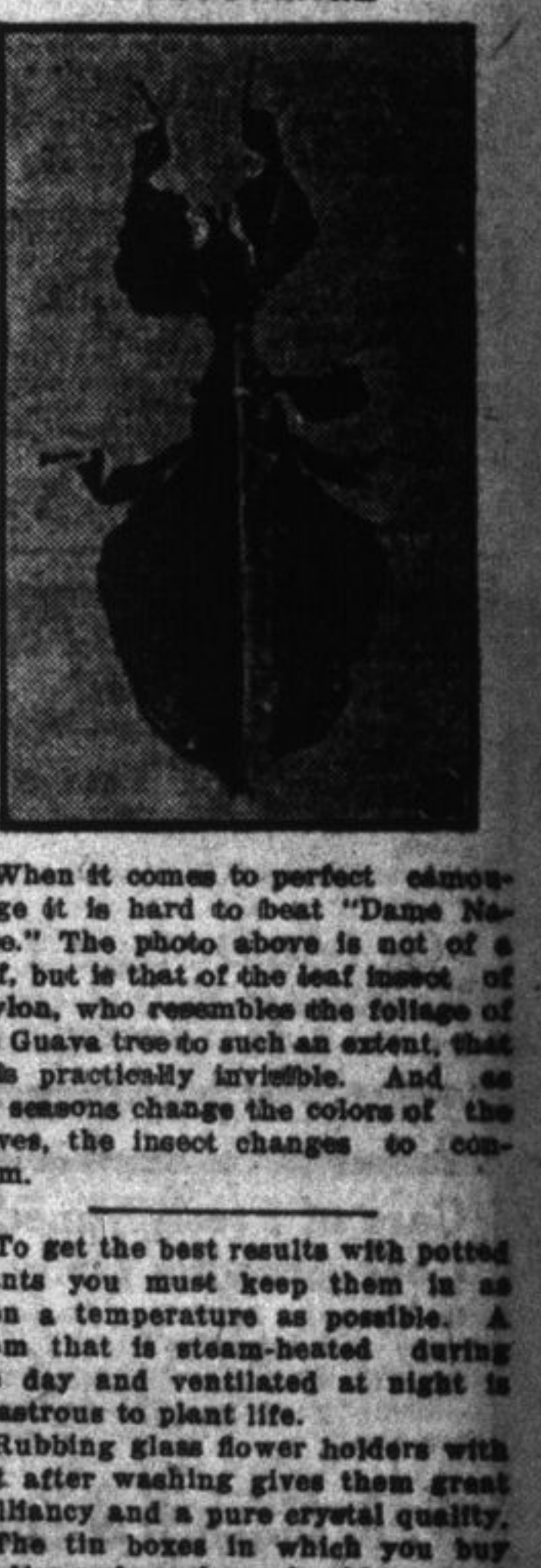
When it comes to perfect camouflage it is hard to beat "Dams Measure."  To get the best results with potted plants you must keep them in an even a temperature as possible. A room that is steam-heated during the day and ventilated at night is disastrous to plant life.
