This year it was held in the city council chamber on Thursday afternoon with Mrs. John Macgillivray, a former president, now a vice-president, in the chair. Mrs. Macgillivray said she knew she was only expressing the feeling of the meeting when she spoke of the regret she felt at the absence through illness of the retiring president, Miss Mowat. The work of the society had been carried on by the vice-presidents since last October, and now Miss Mowat felt she must vacate the office of president.

Mrs. Douglas Chown, the recording secretary, read the report of the year's work (the thirty-first year of the council's life in Kingston) and made special reference to the address given in the Capitol theatre by Mr. Frank Yeigh, Toronto, for the "Save the Children Fund," the sum of
