AMHERST ISLAND MAY BUY FERRY STEAMER

The Council Would Be Aided by the Ontario Government Good Roads Grant.

The council for the township of Amherst Island is still debating over the question of ferry service for the island. The contract the township had with the owners of the steamer Brockville, which for the past five years made two trips a week to Stella, expired last fall and a new agreement has not been signed as yet, and there is a chance that one will not be entered into.

Many of the islanders are of the opinion that the council should purchase a ferry boat, which would run between Millhaven, on the main land, and the island. This boat, providing it was large enough to make trips to Kingston each week, would be of great benefit to the islanders. It has also been suggested that a large scow be bought which would be towed by a motor boat and could be run between these two points.

The people who are anxious to put this scheme through claim that if a ferry boat were purchased the council would be able to get a grant from the Ontario Government toward the upkeep. It is stated that the ferry route would be considered a part of the good roads system, and the province would pay forty per cent. of the cost of maintaining the service. At the present time, it is understood that the council has a sum amounting to about \$5,000, which could be used for the purchase, and the province would also pay its share of the purchase price.

It is claimed that the Napanee Board of Trade is anxious to see the township buy a ferry, as it thinks that if the islanders were landed at Millhaven it would mean that they would likely go to Napanee to do their shopping. The Kingston merchants do not figure that the islanders would go to Napanee, as they have been in the habit of shopping in Kingston for years, and the distance between Millhaven and Napanee is about the same as to Kingston.

A few years ago the Dominion government erected a large wharf at Millhaven, and there is sufficient water at the wharf for a good-sized steamer to land.

The distance between Amherst Island and the mainland is about two to three miles, and takes about twenty minutes for an ordinary motor boat to make the trip. At the present time all the mail is carried over the ice, and in the season of navigation it is taken over by motor boat.

CHARLES G. D. ROBERTS' CANADIAN RECITAL TOUR. Dr. Charles G. D. Roberts possesses many of the characteristics of the old-fashioned gentleman. He is graciousness itself, with the manners of a courtier and the sympathy of a tender-hearted mother. He is also refreshingly proud of his race, his country and his United Empire Loyalist ancestry, ready to take up the cudgels in their behalf with quite reckless ardor. During the British-Boer war, for instance, he publicly challenged an American journalist and adventurer to a duel for derogatory remarks concerning Great Britain. However, the American apologized. The day that brought the British Empire into the Great War found Dr. Roberts seeking enlistment in the Legion of Frontiersmen. After some months as a humble trooper he received a captaincy in the King's Liverpool Regiment, working night and day to whip his hard-drinking, hard-fighting recruits into fit shape for the front. Later he followed them over as an "Eye Witness." On his return he took charge of the Canadian War Records Office in London, with the rank of major, editing most of the "Canada in Flanders" books. His pride in the work of the Canadian army shines out through all his writings.

Late Mrs. Ellen Hunt. The funeral of the late Mrs. Ellen Hunt took place from her late residence, 129 Earl street, on Friday to the Union church at Lansdowne where service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Thropp before the remains were placed in the vault to await burial later. The funeral was in charge of John Cornelius, undertaker.

Spring sunshine flooded the market square on Saturday morning. Flowers bloomed gaily on the florists' wagons and eggs and butter had dropped in price. Eggs were selling at 38 and 40 cents a dozen and butter at 35 cents a pound. Big baskets of the former were on many of the wagons and in the island market. Poultry was for sale at \$1.50 and \$2.00 a piece for fowl, and veal and pork was shown on the square. Mr. E. A. Kelyer, Adolphustown had a big motor truck laden with apples and Mr. Vanalstyne, Hay Bay, also had a big truck load of fine fruit. Lettuce, radishes and rhubarb (home grown), gave another spring-like touch, and winter vegetables were sold on the gardeners wagons.

Supplementary Estimates. In the provincial supplementary estimates Addington district is voted \$18,000 for bridges, and Renfrew district \$12,500 for the same purpose; Addington and Frontenac districts for drainage works, \$2,500. The sum of \$19,000 is voted to Rockwood Hospital for medicines and medical comforts; groceries and provisions; fuel, light and water; clothing; laundry and cleaning; furniture and furnishings; office expenses; farm expenses; contingencies (additional). An additional vote of \$500 is made to the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's Association.
