Lady Genevieve Simcoe's diary records this trip in 1792:

As they passed through the Lake of the Thousands Islands they came to the place where now stands the town of Gananoque. It is related that the first white man to live on the peninsula on the west side of Gananoque river was Joel Stone, marooned there by the crew of a bateau. Stone was put ashore and left to his own resources. He fastened a handkerchief to a pole and displayed it as a flag of distress. Fortunately a resident on a nearby island saw it, and sent two Indians to rescue Stone.
