AN AUDIT IS DESIRED.

By a Number of the Ratepayers of Bedford Township. Twenty or more of the ratepayers of the township of Bedford have petitioned for a provincial audit of the books of the municipality. Other townships of Frontenac have had an audit and Bedford would also like to know how their financial affairs stand when exposed to the eye of a professional accountant. It is likely that the Bedford council will deal with the petition at its next meeting and direct that an audit be held. The council last fall made a change in the financial affairs of the township by directing that the township moneys must no longer be deposited in the name of the treasurer. It had been the custom for years for the treasurer to deposit the receipts to his own account, just as was done in some of the other townships of the county. The Bedford council decided that the municipality should get the interest on the account.

Cape Vincent Elections. At Cape Vincent, N.Y., Schuyler Lowe, Republican, was named president over Frank Webster, Democrat. Maud Fluke, Democrat, defeated Mrs. Frank Gardner, Republican, for collector.

Walter P. Cummings, Democrat, and Walter P. Eaton, Republican, candidates for village trustees, were elected at Clayton, N.Y., over union ticket candidates by decisive margins.

Frederick Rodenhurst, headed the union ticket, unopposed, polling 563 votes. Jay Swartout was elected treasurer by 541 and John Basinet received 481 for collector.

Adding to Accommodation. The Gananoque Board of Education is purchasing the old post office building, and it will be fitted up with a couple of class rooms. The constantly increasing attendance at the school, which now has an enrolment of 192 scholars, calls for more room for classes, and the acquisition of this building will help out considerably at present. Some ten years ago the attendance was only about one hundred, and it certainly is most encouraging to note the increase each year.

More Prize Hogs. William Veder, Salmon Point, sold to Percy McConnell twelve hogs that averaged two hundred and thirty-three pounds and at five and a half months old. Who can beat it?

## TRIP OF THE SIMCOES UP THE ST. LAWRENCE

The Islands Had Names Changed—Arrival in Kingston in Year 1792.

Lady Genevieve Simcoe's diary records this trip in 1792:

As they passed through the Lake of the Thousand Islands they came to the place where now stands the town of Gananoque. It is related that the first white man to live on the peninsula on the west side of Gananoque river was Joel Stone, marooned there by the crew of a bateau. Stone was put ashore and left to his own resources. He fastened a handkerchief to a pole and displayed it as a flag of distress. Fortunately a resident on a nearby island saw it, and sent two Indians to rescue Stone. He afterwards fell in with a man named Carey, and they kept a tavern, which for a long time was only accessible by boat, as there was no road along the shore through the forest.

It is related that at this tavern there was never bread to eat but always biscuits. Carey and Stone kept two cows, and the milk of the cows they exchanged with the bateau men for biscuits, and some of the biscuits they exchanged with the Indians for venison, fish and wild fruit. This tavern was doing business when the Simcoes came along towards the close of June, 1792, but Mrs. Simcoe says the house was so dirty that she could not sleep in it, but made her bed in a tent although it rained throughout the evening and during the greater part of the night.

Draw Near To Kingston.

Under date of July 1, Mrs. Simcoe writes: "After passing Grand Isle and Isle Cauchois, we drew near to Kingston which we were aware of before we saw the houses, as we discerned the white waves of Lake Ontario beyond, looking like a sea, for the wind blew extremely fresh."

The Grande Isle Mrs. Simcoe speaks of was so called by the French, but its name was changed by Simcoe himself to Wolfe Island, in honor of the victor of the Plains of Abraham. Isle Cauchois was also re-named, being called Howe Island, after Lord Howe. Simcoe's own name is also borne by one of the islands that lies towards the western side of the arm of the lake on which Kingston stands.

Kingston Reached. Mrs. Simcoe writes that "Kingston is a small town of about fifty wooden houses and merchants' storehouses,.... there is a small garrison here, and a harbor of ships."

The garrison welcomed the arrival of the Lieutenant-governor, by firing a salute; and then the Simcoes went to the house of the commandant, which, Mrs. Simcoe says, she found much cooler than the great house in Montreal, the Chateau. She speaks of the flatness of the place, and therefore "incapable of being rendered defensible," and so unfit for the seat of government.

The Simcoes remained some time at Kingston, for it was there that the Lieutenant-Governor organized the first Government of Upper Canada. His office was a small wooden cottage on a small plot of land adjoining St. Paul's churchyard on Queen Street.

There, the Legislative Council was completed; there the Province was divided into electoral districts; and from there went out the writs calling upon the electors to choose the members of Upper Canada's first House of Assembly.

Has Her 27th Child. Lessau, Germany, March 20.—All records for Germany were topped here when Frau Becker, wife of a manual laborer, bore her twenty-seventh child, a healthy boy. Eleven of the other boys and girls are still living, among them several pairs of twins.

On the same night of the arrival of the latest addition to the family, his oldest married sister, Anna, gave birth to twin girls.

Frau Becker is 47 years old and her husband 45.

Ontario Founding's Estate May Go to University

Edmonton, Alta., March 20.—A founding left on a Prince Edward county, Ontario, doorstep in 1871, and brought up by a Picton family, died recently in Saskatoon in the person of August Maxwell, railroadier, leaving no will for his \$3,000 estate here. Justice Ives ruled in the supreme court that, not having been formally adopted under the laws of Ontario, his foster-brothers have no claim.

Federal authorities have already claimed the cash, but the attorney-general of Alberta claims it for the University of Alberta under the Devolution of Estates Act.
