### THE CONTRACT FOR GARBAGE COLLECTION

Health Committee Will Recommend That It Be Given to Eugene Dennee.

The civic health committee will recommend to the city council that Mr. Eugene Dennee be given the contract for garbage removal for the next three years, at \$8,400 per year. This was decided on at a meeting of the committee held on Thursday afternoon, when tenders were under consideration. Mr. Dennee had the contract for the garbage removal during the past three years and the members of the committee are greatly pleased with his work and while his price is a little higher than other tenders received, the members are of the opinion that it will be in the best interests of the city to award Mr. Dennee the contract.

Swedish Steamer Sunk. Philadelphia, Pa., March 20.—The Swedish steamer Thyra, from Cuba to New York with sugar was sunk yesterday in a collision with the United States tank steamer Ardmore, forty-five miles southeast of Delaware breakwater. Her crew was picked up and landed here to-day.

Minister Died at 101. Tacoma, Wash., March 20.—Chaplain Robert S. Stubbs, one of the oldest ministers in the nation died here yesterday, lacking but three months of being 102 years of age. He was a Congregationalist and was born in Scarborough, England.

### DEATH CALLS LORD CURZON

(Continued from page 1) was severely criticized and in the grumbling that preceded the fall of the Tories and the rise of the Labor government in the winter of 1923-24 much of the dissatisfaction was directed against him.

With the fall of the Conservative government Lord Curzon was obliged to relinquish his post as foreign secretary. Some persons thought that in the prime minister's parting page of honors the name of Curzon would head the list, with a dukedom at last. But there was no dukedom in the list.

Lord Curzon was born at Kedleston, January 11th, 1859, the eldest son of the Rev. Alfred Nathaniel Holden Curzon, the fourth Baron Scarsdale. He married twice, taking an American as his wife on both occasions. In 1895 he married Miss Mary Victoria Leiter, daughter of L. Z. Leiter of Washington. She died in 1906, the year after they returned from India, leaving three daughters. His second wife, whom he married in 1917, was Mrs. Grace Elvina Hinds Duggan, a daughter of J. Monroe Hinds, who had been United States minister to Brazil, and the widow of Alfred Duggan of Buenos Aires.

The travels of Lord Curzon and the books they engendered were recognized with a gold medal by the Royal Geographical Society. Among his published volumes were: "Russia in Central Asia," 1889; "Persia and the Persian Question," 1892; "Problems of the Far East," 1894; "Lord Curzon of India," 1906; "Principles and Methods of University Reform," 1909; "Modern Parliamentary Eloquence," 1913; "War Poems and Other Translations," 1915; "Subjects of the Day," 1915; "Tales of Travel," 1923.

### No Information Is Given Regarding the Royal Route

Paris, March 20.—The French Government, in compliance with the British sovereign's request, has zealously guarded information regarding the train and route by which the British royal party is crossing France to the Mediterranean to take ship for a health cruise which the doctors have prescribed for his majesty.

At Paris, King George posed for press photographers and these pictures, appearing this morning, show him to be much thinner than usual.

### THE STRICKEN AREAS STILL PROSTRATED

Between 850 and 900 Dead and 7,000 Injured in Ohio Valley.

Chicago, March 20.—Still prostrated, but with hurried efforts at temporary relief supplemented by the arrival of trained workers, supplies and medicines, the storm-stricken areas of the Ohio Valley today continued to count the terrific loss in life and property of its greatest tornado catastrophe.

Fairly systematic checking in thirty-five cities and towns in the path of Wednesday afternoon's storm indicated a death list of between 850 and 900, with approximately 7,000 injured and many other thousand homeless.

Temporary morgues and hospitals were filled to overflowing while frantic men, women and children search long lines of dead for missing dear ones. In some instances, doctors performed major operations out of doors without anaesthetics.

### DISCOVERED HIDING IN SECRET CHAMBER

Glace Bay, N.S., Bank Clerk Is Charged With Theft of \$20,000.

Glace Bay, N.S., March 20.—Justin Bennett, former teller in the local branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, for whom the police of the Continent have been searching since his disappearance Jan. 20th last, which coincided with the disappearance of upwards of \$20,000 of the bank funds, was found yesterday morning hidden in a secret chamber in an upper room in the residence of his parents at Dominion, near here.

Bennett has been reported to have crossed into Mexico, but local police quietly worked on the theory that the young man had never left Glace Bay and his home had been under close observation for two months.

Nova Scotia cabinet and miners' representatives are discussing the matter of the men maintaining the mines of the province so that there may be no serious impairment during the strike.
