MANUFACTURE OF SHOES.

An Interesting Address Given by Edgar Lockett.

On Monday evening, Edgar Lock ett, of the Lockett shoe store, was the special speaker at the weekly meeting of the Y' Club. F. B. Pense presided. Ernest Madrand, chairman of the musical committee, was in charge of the singing. Mrs. R. H. Ward and Mrs. Wilson provided the

Mr. Lockett, who has spent considerable time in the large shoe manufacturing concerns across the border, gave an excellent address on the subject of the manufacture o shoes. Mr. Lockett traced the manufacture of the shoe from the time that shoemaker would go from place to place in country and make shoes for the whole family. He told of the different stages through which the shoe passes before it is ready to go on the foot.

The making of leather was ex plained in detail by the speaker. Mr Lockett described some of the machines used in the large shoe industries. He stated that at the present time the greater part of the shoes worn by the Canadian people are made in Canada, which was certainly a great thing for this country, as gave so much employment.
