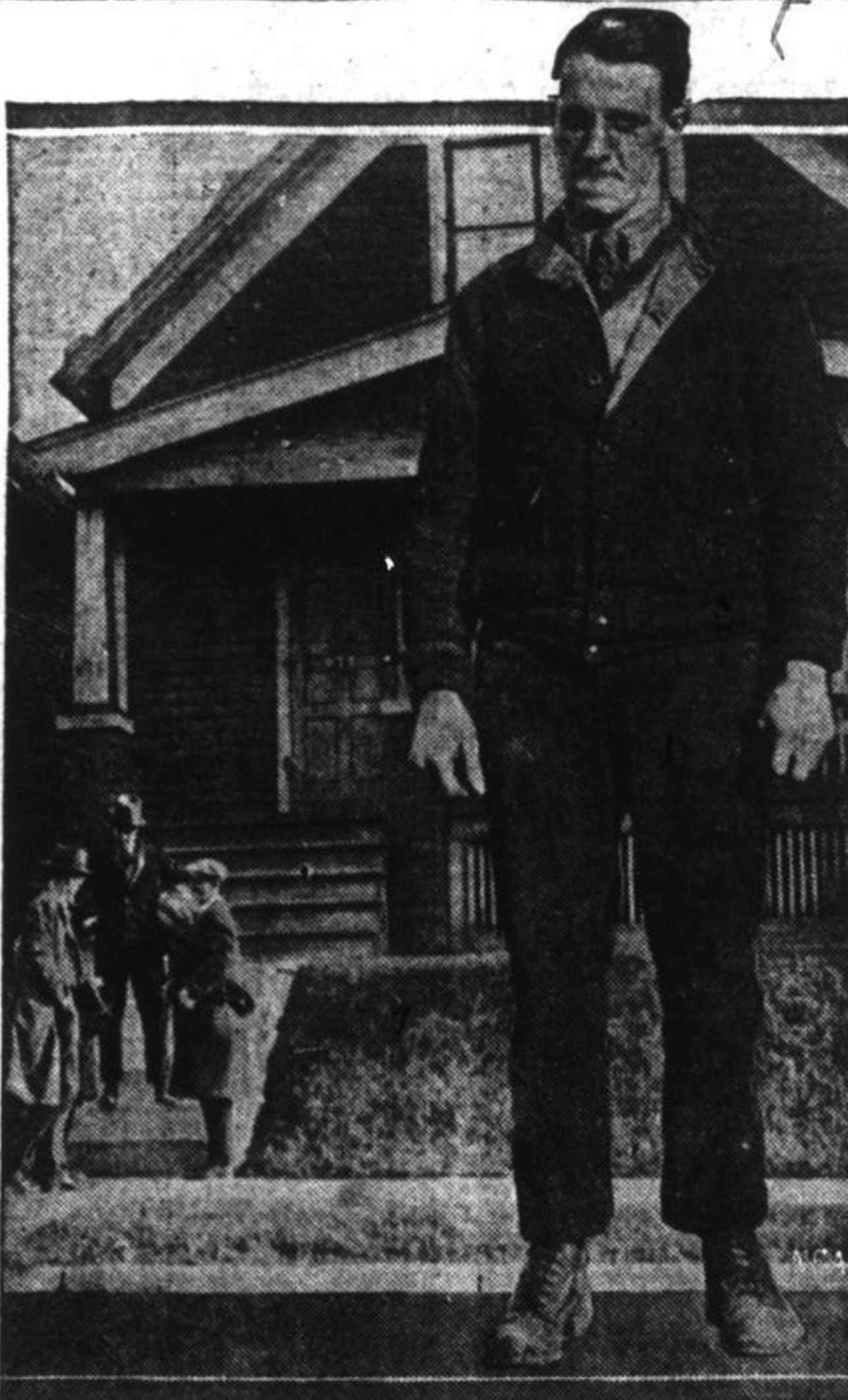

FIRE DAMAGES ODESSA CHURCH

(Continued from page 1) nish assistance if need be. The Odessa people were informed that the fire department would give aid if it was needed, but in about half an hour word was received that the fire was under control and it was unnecessary to send equipment. When the news was received in the city, a representative of the Whig motored to Odessa, but by the time he reached there the fire was practically out. It was evident that the residents of the village thought they were going to be up against a real fire, and for that reason every seat had been carried out of the church building, so, in case of the whole building burning, there would be that much less to feed the flames. In removing the seats, which had just been freshly varnished, a number and the stove-pipes, had been taken down and put out on the street. The large platform at the back of the building had been carried to the other end of the church, but it was found too large to go through the door.

Confined to Front. The sheet-iron roof on the building kept the fire from spreading. The fire, which was confined to the front part of the church, made it necessary for some of the iron to be torn off so that water could be poured in.

The Whig representative was informed that never in the history of the village did the people organize and fight a fire as they did on Thursday evening. Not only did the men carry water, but the women, some sixty-five and seventy years of age, were right on the job. The Odessa people in past years have had a number of very bad fires, and it is needless to say that they are greatly alarmed when a fire call is sounded. The Methodist church was destroyed by fire some time ago, and about a couple of years ago, two stores in the village fell a prey to the flames.

Eugene Smith, one of the members of the Free Methodist church, said that he thought the loss would be about one thousand dollars. As soon as the adjusters would go over the loss, it was the intention of the church authorities to put the building into good condition at once, as the district quarterly meeting will be held in Odessa on Thursday, April 9th. There will be delegates at this meeting from the Kingston district, and as far east as Gananoque. It is very unfortunate that a fire occurred at this time, as the

building presented a fine appearance with its new coat of paint and varnish, and everything was in readiness for the quarterly meeting.

GEN. CURRIE DEPLORES BRITISH STATEMENT

Explains Why 25 Canadians Were Executed and No Australians.

Montreal, April 3.—Shows a London dispatch in which Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, British secretary of war, was credited with stating in the House of Commons, in reply to a question, that twenty-five members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force were executed during the war for military offences, five New Zealanders and no Australians, Sir Arthur Currie, formerly commander-in-chief of the Canadian Corps, made the following statement:

"It is most unfortunate that any such figures as those given in the cable should have been asked for and it is hard to see what conceivable good anyone can derive from the information conveyed. It seems, however, a little hard to explain why such question should have been asked or answered in the British House of Commons without reference to Canada. The matter is one which concerns Canada alone.

"The subject of military executions was always painful, was one never discussed except when necessary, and it is lamentable to have it reawakened. There is, however, another aspect of the matter. The answer given by the secretary of war makes a most unfair comparison between Canadians and Australians. The Governments of the dominions never gave up their authority over their own troops, but, so far as discipline was concerned, this authority was delegated more or less completely to the commander-in-chief of the British armies in France. This principle is definitely stated in an agreement made between the war office and the minister of overseas military forces of Canada in 1918. Australia delegated authority on this point less completely than did Canada. For one thing, no court-martial on an Australian soldier could take place without one or more Australian officers being on the court.

"In the same way, it is generally known that no death sentences on Australian soldiers were ever to be approved. While this latter fact was, so far as I know, never published in orders and was a matter solely between the British Government and the commander-in-chief and his adjutant-general, the situation was perfectly well known and realized.

"I do not wish to make any reflection on the conduct of the Australian, but the fact that none was executed, while twenty-five Canadians were, proved nothing whatever. If the facts of the case as reported by the Canadian Press are correct, I consider the British Government has committed another stupid blunder and struck a dangerous blow at imperial friendship."
