Mrs. Revelle entered a strong proest over one clause in the report of the management committee, which recommended "no action," on the request of the Kingston Humane Society, to hang posters in the class rooms of the various schools, drawing attention to "Be Kind to Ani mals" week.

Trustee Bishop, chairman of the management committee, stated that he had no doubt but that every member of the board was in sympathy with the object of the placing of the bills in the schools, but pointed out that for years the pupils in the schools had been taught to be kind to dumb animals, and while the bills might emphasize the matter, he felt that if permission was granted by the board, it would open up the way for a lot of propaganda in the schools and the board would experience a lot of trouble similar to that experienced some time ago.

Mrs. Revelle said that the teaching of the children in the schools went farther than the teaching of the three R's and felt that the teaching of the children to be kind to animals was also part of their education. There would be no harm in having the bills on the walls of the class rooms all the year round, for that matter, and she felt that it was a very serious matter for the board to turn down the request, Mrs. Re-
