EASTER SERVICES IN THE CHURCHES

St. George's cathedral was beautifully decorated with flowers, ferns and palms for the Easter day services, which began with a celebration of the Holy Communion at 8.30 a.m., at which Rev. W. E. Kidd was celebrant. The cathedral organist, Mr. R. F. Harvey, played "I Know Thy Redeemer Liveth" (Handel) as the people were entering the church, and "Jesus Christ is Risen To-day" was sung by the congregation. At eight o'clock the Dean of Ontario was celebrant and at eleven o'clock the Bishop of Ontario celebrated, when the service was fully choral. Eyre's office for the Holy Communion was beautifully sung by the choir. The anthem, "They Have Taken Away My Lord," was sung during the offertory. Mr. C. B. S. Harvey and Mr. Eytan Warburton were the soloists at both morning services.

The congregations were unusually large, the number of communicants at the three services being 576. At three o'clock a children's service was held in the cathedral to which the scholars of St. George's mission Sunday school on Montreal street were brought in motors, loaned by members of the congregation.

Evening service was sung at seven o'clock, when Tours service was used and the anthem, "O Death Where is Thy Sting" (Mauder), was sung. The Dean of Ontario was the morning preacher and at evening the bishop of the diocese preached. Both sermons proclaimed the promise of life eternal confirmed by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.

At the morning service the dean read the announcement of the ordination to the diaconate on April 21st of Robert Spencer Rayson, of the parish cathedral, at present of the General Theological Seminary, New York.

10.30 o'clock His Grace Archbishop Spratt said pontifical high mass, after which the papal benediction was imparted to the faithful. Vespers in the evening was very largely attended. The music for the day was specially prepared by Prof. Nourry, and in the morning the choir sang the celebrated mass from Bordest in F, a choir of thirty men taking part. The solo parts in the mass were taken by Messrs. N. O'Connor, T. F. Gelle, C. Cross and R. Marchand. Professor Nourry rendered Handel's Alleluiah and Mr. N. O'Connor sang, "Comfort Ye" from the Messiah. At vespers the men's choir and the boys' choir rendered the music, and the "Hæc Dies" (Nourry) was rendered by the men's choir.

"The Dawn."
A beautiful Easter Cantata "The Dawn," was exquisitely rendered in the church of Our Mother of Sorrows on Easter Sunday evening. Those who had the pleasure of hearing this delightful musical treat were charmed by the beauty and pathos of the parts so sweetly taken by the Sisters' choir, under the leadership of their efficient organist, Sister Genevieve. The solos were sung by Mr. James Kane in his rare and masterful voice, placing vividly before the minds of the audience the touching scene of the meeting between the Risen Saviour and Mary Magdalene. All the parts were rendered in a manner leaving nothing to desire, especially "O Grave where is thy Victory, O Death where is thy sting." The cantata made a peaceful closing to the sorrowful scenes of Holy Week causing all hearts to exult in the joys of the Resurrection.

St. Andrew's Presbyterian.
The morning worship at St. Andrew's was a solemn communion service. At the evening service the organ music was very fine. The prelude was "Spring Song" by Hollins; the offertory "Christ Triumphant," by Yon; and postlude "Gloria in Excelsis" by Mozart. The choir sang Stainer's "They Have Taken Away My Lord," in which the solo passages were effectively taken by Miss McLeod and Mr. Ernest Hess. Mr. Hess also sang "The Trumpet Shall Sound" from Handel's Messiah. Nothing could have been finer than his rendering of this noble passage. The finish and beauty of the musical service reflect the greatest credit on Mrs. A. R. B. Williamson, the organist and choir leader.

St. Luke's Church.
The Queen of Festivals was fittingly observed in St. Luke's church on Sunday. The Sanctuary Guild took special pains to have the altar and chancel profusely decorated with Easter flowers and the entire church presented a very splendid appearance. The rector, assisted by the lay reader, Mr. Hamshaw, celebrated communion service at eight o'clock and the largest number on record received. At eleven o'clock, choral matins were sung. The musical programme at the morning service included Te Deum Laudamus in Ab (Prier), by Miss M. Webber and choir; anthem, "Behold I Am Alive for Evermore," by Mr. H. Birchall and choir; offertory solo, "The Resurrection Morn," by Mrs. R. Fletcher; organ postlude, "Easter March."

Nearly 250 pupils and teachers attended Sunday school in the afternoon and the lessons were read by Mr. Cochrane and the rector gave an address and pronounced the benediction. The contributions to the mitre box were very large.

At the evening service a splendid musical programme was rendered, under the direction of Mr. Bert Cooper, organist and choirmaster. The offerings for the day amounted to \$200.

St. James'.
The joy of Easter was finely expressed in music at St. James' church both morning and evening. Tours "Communion" was sung by the choir with Mr. Baldry and Miss H. Guild taking the solo passages. The inspiring Te Deum of King Hall was done very well indeed. The anthem "Easter Triumph" was also effective, and a solo part was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Ferguson. The pastor, the Rev. T. W. Savary, delivered a helpful Easter message. There was a very large congregation.

At the evening service the anthem "Christ is Risen" by Tertius Noble was most pleasing, as was Miss Derry's rendering of the solo parts. Miss Bureau took the solo in the Nunc Dimittis and Major Thompson sang very feelingly "The Lord is My Light and My Salvation."

St. Paul's Church.
St. Paul's church was decorated with beautiful flowers for Easter. The congregations were large at all the services, the holy communion services at 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. being especially well attended. At evening prayer, there was specially good music and singing. Mr. J. Alexander rendered splendid solos morning and evening. At the evening service very good solos in excellent voice. The anthem, "The Resurrection Morning," was beautifully rendered, the solo parts being splendidly taken by Mr. H. Secker.

St. John's Church.
Bright and well attended services marked the services of Easter at St. John's church, Portsmouth. Communion service was held at 8.30 o'clock by Rev. J. C. Dixon of Kingston, and by the rector, Rev. Elyard Smith at eleven o'clock. The children's Easter service was held at three o'clock and the Lenten missionary offering by the children was presented. The musical programme for the day included Hudson's anthem, "Now is Christ Risen," the solo part of which was taken by Miss B. Henderson. A substantial Easter thank offering was presented for church extension.

St. Mary's Cathedral.
Easter Sunday was fittingly observed in St. Mary's cathedral on Sunday and the early masses were particularly well attended, hundreds receiving Holy Communion. At

and inspiring communion service was held in the morning. At the evening service, the choir entered to the inspiring music of "Christ is Risen." Mr. Wellington Simmons sang "Fear Ye Not, O Israel" with feeling and effect. "Why Seek Ye the Living Among the Dead," was given by the entire choir, and Mrs. Trencor sang "The First Easter Morn," most beautifully. Illness prevented the male chorus from appearing.

This excellent musical programme was selected and directed by Miss Bessie Rogers, organist and choir leader.

At the evening service, a tenor solo, "From Out of the Cave of Death," was delightfully rendered by Mr. A. Middleton.
