LAST MEETING OF METHODIST DISTRICT

To Take Place in Gananoque on May 12th and 13th—Busy Times Ahead.

It has been decided that the final meeting of the Kingston Methodist district will take place in Gananoque on Tuesday, May 12th, and Wednesday, May 13th. The ministerial session will be held on Tuesday, and the general meeting will take place in Grace church the following day. Rev. G. A. Sisco, pastor of Cataract Methodist church, has been asked to give the address on Wednesday evening.

Rev. W. H. Raney, the chairman of the district, when speaking to the Whig, stated that it was very important that all matters pertaining to the churches be finally wound up as early in May as possible, so that the schedule can be made out in readiness for the district meeting. As the Methodist church will enter the United church on June 10th, this is the last time the Methodists of the Kingston district will meet together to transact business.

The meeting of the Montreal conference takes place in Montreal the last week in May. The stationing committee meets on Monday, May 25th, and the general sessions of the conference open on the 28th, and will continue over the week-end. This will also be the last meeting of the Montreal Methodist Conference.

Up until the present time only two ministers on the Kingston district are moving this year. Rev. Dr. R. H. Bell, of Sydenham, is going to Young church, Winnipeg, and Rev. G. A. Sisco has been invited to Renfrew. The latter has accepted the invitation, pending the decision of the stationing committee. It is rumored that there may be a couple of other changes in the district, but up until the present time the chairman has not received any definite information.

The three last weeks of May will certainly be busy ones for the Methodists in the Kingston district, as in addition to the district meeting and the Montreal conference, the branch meeting of the Women's Missionary Society is to take place in Kingston in Sydenham street church, commencing the 19th of May, and lasting until the evening of the 21st.
