IN MARINE CIRCLES

Water Level Not Lower.
The statement from a canal official at Morrisburg to the effect that the water level is fifteen inches lower than it was a year ago is now contradicted by the engineers of the department of marine and fisheries, who say that there is little or no difference. On Lake Superior, however, vessels are being required to load only to eighteen feet six inches. Last year they were permitted to nineteen feet.

Shipping Prospects Not Bright.
The shipping prospects are not as bright as last year, according to a well-known local marine man. The grain crop of last season was nearly a quarter less than that of the year before and there seems to have been more than the usual amount taken down by rail during the winter, so that cargoes will be light and hard to find.
