FORBIDDEN TO SPEAK.

Bishop Manning Inhibits Ex-Bishop W. M. Brown.

New York, April 20 .- Bishop William T. Manning forbade Dr. William Montgomery Brown, former Protestant Episcopal bishop of Arkansas, from officiating or speaking in any parish or mission of the New York diocese.

In another letter to Dr. W. N. Guthrie, rector of St. Marks-in-the-Bouwerie, Bishop Manning said that Dr. Guthrie's invitation to Dr. Brown to speak in St. Mark's was in "open contempt and defiance of the auth-

ority and law of the church." Bishop Brown was found guilty of heresy last year by a trial court of the Protestant Episcopal church. Later a court of review affirmed this judgment and ordered him "deposed from the ministry of this church."

Boston, April 20 .- In a flurry of snow and with a bleak wind blowing in their faces, ninety-five runners started from Hopkinton at noon today in the twenty-ninth Boston A.A. marathon road race. The course, which is of the standard marathon distance of 26 miles, 386 yards, ends at the B.A.A. club house in Boston. 
