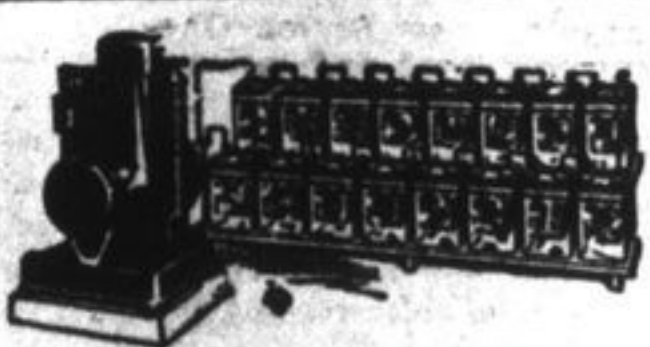

Mrs. Dupuis died Thursday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John McNamara on Main street, Marine City, Mich., where she had resided several years. She was 80 years and six months old.

To Mrs. Dupuis fell the distinction of having reared six lake vessel masters, five of whom survive her. They are Captain George Dupuis, Captain Joseph Dupuis and Captain Fred Dupuis, of Marine City; Captain John Dupuis and Captain Herbert Dupuis, of Sombra. The sixth son was the late Captain Charles Dupuis, of Marine City. Mrs. Dupuis was a sister of the late Captain A. Miller, well known tug master. Her daughter, Mrs. McNamara, is the wife of the engineer in the steamer Joseph Sellwood.
