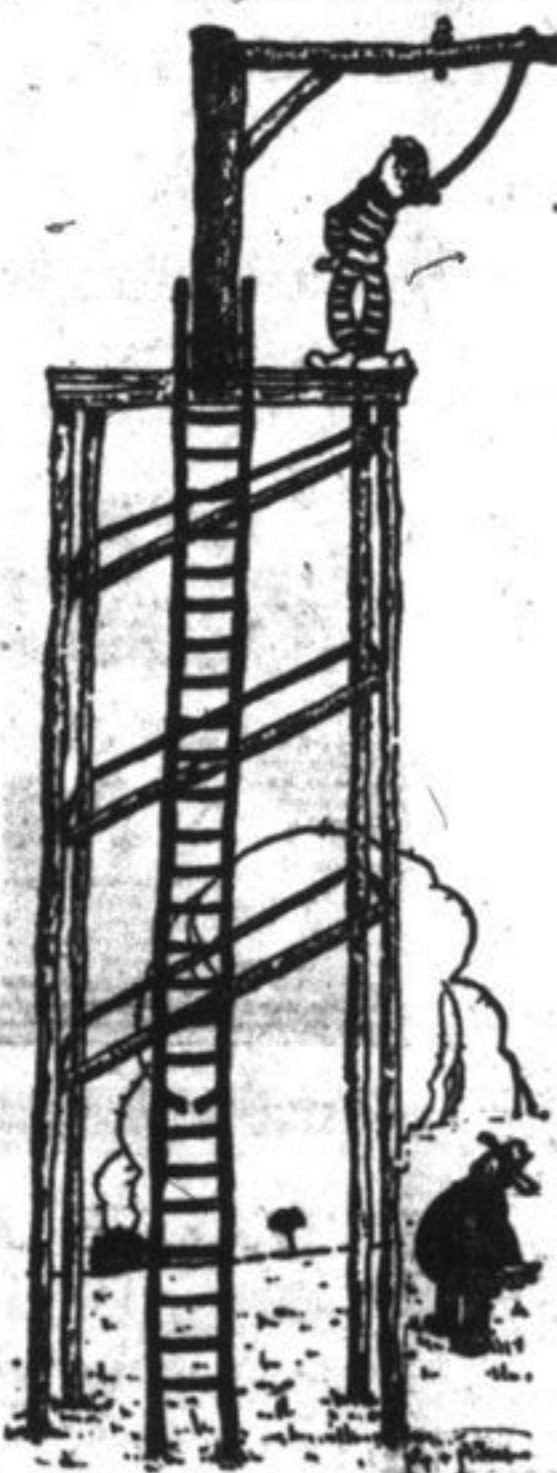

Brave, Unselfish Deeds Earned for Maisonneuve Place in Heroes' Roll.

Of all the gallant gentlemen of France who laid the foundations of our country and whose names are a glory to our history, none possessed a finer, more Christian character than Paul de Chomey, Sieur de Maisonneuve. Founder of that little mission outpost in the heart of heathendom and savagery, which has become the greatest city in Canada, fearless protector of its infancy, arbiter of its daily life and destiny for a quarter of a century, in his life-time he was denied all recognition of his mastery activity and, in the end, after suffering undeserved humiliation at the hands of the Governor of Canada, was ignominiously dismissed without reward save his own sure consciousness of work well done and a life nobly lived.

Ville-Marie, alternatively bearing the name Montreal which Jacques Cartier had fastened upon the spot, had passed through its troublous early days and was firmly established. Any inhabitant of the place would have told you that its marvellous survival amid the dangers which had so often threatened to overwhelm it was due to the loving care of its patron, the Blessed Virgin Mary, in whose honour this

of Montreal, Maisonneuve endured insult and alimony and unwarranted abrogation of his authority with meek submission. It was his practice to set an example of instant obedience to a superior officer and his principles forbade him to seek satisfaction for personal slights. When, however, the prerogatives of his lords, the Company of Montreal, were assailed, he was prompt to move for redress, and he won his points.

In 1665 there came with pomp to Canada the Marquis de Tracey, newly appointed Lieutenant-General of the King throughout the two Americas; backed by a regiment of veterans, the famous Carignan-Salieres, to settle the Iroquois, the scourge of the valley of the St. Lawrence, and to reorganize the government. Apostle of his royal master's increasingly-prevailing absolutism, the old general, who had fought that master's battles all over Europe as friend and assistant of the great Turenne, could ill brook the unadorned self-sufficiency of a rough backwoods fortress settlement of less than five hundred people, even though that independence derived from the King himself by charter. Everything must be centralized at Quebec. Moreover, the Marquis came prejudiced against the Sieur de Maisonneuve. His mind had been poisoned by the latter's enemies, some of the former administrators of the country who had failed to extend their personal authority over Montreal. One of the first acts of the powerful Lieutenant-General was summarily to dismiss the faithful Governor of Montreal. He ordered him to return at once to France as being incapable of maintaining the rank and appointment of Governor which he held. Then, realizing that this act was strictly illegal in spite of his almost unbounded powers, to prevent enquiry at Court, he appointed Maisonneuve's second-in-command to the vacant post in the following casualistic
