Miss A. Tweddell and Miss Sanders favored with two vocal solos. Miss Alice Singleton played a piano solo, while Mrs. Jolliffe gave a reading. A nominating committee was appointed, and will make a report at the next meeting of the society, which takes place on Friday next.

P.W.O.R. STREET PARADE.

Long Service Medal Presented to Lieut. C. Cockburn. The P.W.O.R. held its first street parade of the season Friday evening.
