The steamer Elm Bay, coal laden from Fairhaven to Montreal, went aground at the outer pier at Fairhayen on Saturday evening. The Donnelly Salvage & Wrecking company. of Kingston, was notified at midnight on Saturday, and immediately proceeded to the scene. The trip over was rather slow on account of the fog. The tug Cornwall and the light er Cobourg arrived at about ten of clock Sunday morning, and after taktons of coal from the steamer, which was grounded about one hundred feet from the outer pier, the tug Cornwall was able to release the steamer. which proceeded to Cape Vincent.

The coal, which was removed, was put back in place and the steamer proceeded to Montreal, and appeared to be none the worse of her experience. The tug and the lighter reached Kingston on Monday morning.
