Golfers often hear the expression that it is necessary to get in back of the clubhead with the body in the hitting swing. Most players, I venture, do not know what that means and have to guess at it. The reason the body weight is transferred to the right, in the back swing, is so that the weight will be in position, back of the ball, to be thrown forward, into the ball, at the moment the ball is hit. It was seen ago that the player could slap his weight against the ball, together with the flying clubhead, and get 25 yards more of distance, and that's why we do it, though what I mean to convey is that this is no new discovery at all. Recently I received a very interesting letter on this subject. Coming from one of Hebrew birth, I am willing to accept it in part as final. Here it is:

Likes Sports.

"I beg to disagree with you on man "Babe" Ruth suffered a com-

"Instead he devotes an unusually large part of his time to his education, which is, perhaps, one of the ways of making money in the end.

"However, the average Americanborn Jewish youngster has the same attitude for sports as the other American boys. Baseball is the most popular of all. Basketball is a close

"Drop around to the playgrounds in any city and you will find the Jewish boy well represented in every game that is being played."

Now for the punch of the letter, the very best reason I have ever heard in explanation of the scarcity of the Hebrew in major league ball.

Parents Object. "The big reason for the scarcity of Jewish big leaguers is the strong parental objection to an athletic car-

eer of the professional type. "The parents of the present Jewish generation of youngsters are for the most part folks who were born in Europe. They have different interests and ideas of recreation and think more highly of intellectual pursuits than indulgence in sports.

"When the present generation of Jewish American-born youngsters becomes the adult generation, and being born in the country has an interest in the national game, then there will be no parental objection to a sports career and Hebrew stars will make their names in the ma-

The writer of the letter said he expected this to happen in about 10 years and that John McGraw's wish for a Hebrew to star with the New York Giants would be fulfilled.
