INCREASE IS SHOWN IN CASES OF INTOXICATION

In the Annual Report Prepared by Chief of Police Robinson.

Some very interesting statistics are presented in the annual report of Chief of Police Robinson, which has just be issued.

During the year there were 148 cases of intoxication before the court, as compared with 104 in 1923, 98 in 1922, and 168 in 1921.

There were 21 cases for an infraction of the O.T.A., as compared with 23 in 1923, 31 in 1922 and 40 in 1921.

There were 57 cases for infractions under the Motor Vehicle Act. In 1923 there were 30, in 1922, 46, and in 1921, 95.

During the past year there were 16 cases for infractions of the city by-laws, in 1923 there were 8, in 1922, 58, and in 1921, 37.

In all there were 361 cases before the magistrate, including the follow-

Out of the 148 cases of drunkenness there was a conviction recorded
in every case with the exception of
one. Of the 21 cases for infractions
of the O.T.A., eight cases were dismissed.

During the year there were five cases before the magistrate under the Children's Protection Act, under the Children's Aid Society.

There were thirty-two motor accidents reported during the year and two of these proved fatal. Other items in the report include

the following:

Bicycles reported stolen, 81; bicycles recovered, 46; autos reported stolen, 4; autos recovered, 4; places of business found open after hours and reported by the police, 10; summonses issued, 175; warrants issued, 20; men in for protection at the police station, 511; articles and goods stolen or lost, 39 cases; articles and goods recovered, 17 cases; jewelry stolen, 9 cases; jewelry recovered, 5

The Fines Collected.

Fines, costs, etc., collected by the police department for the year 1924:
Paid to the city treasurer, \$4,-468.95; witness fees, \$45.15; county treasurer, \$84.50; inspector of weights and measures, \$15; stenographer, \$23; damages paid to plaintiffs, \$57; license inspector, \$230; provincial constable, \$8; receiver general of Canada, \$215; College of Physicians, \$25; total, \$5,171.60.

License fees paid into the city treasury by police department: Carters licenses, \$1,117; auto trucks, \$160; taxi cabs, \$480; livery, \$20; drivers' licenses, \$13.50; second-hand dealers and junk, \$280; total \$2,070.50. Total fines and costs to the city, \$4,468.95. Total license fees, \$2,070.50. Grand total, \$6,-

A comparison with the report for 1923, shows that during the year just closed, there were 34 more cases before the magistrate in 1924 than in 1923. The number of cases in 1924 amounted to 361 and in 1923 there were 327. In 1922 there were 373 cases on the public court calendar.
