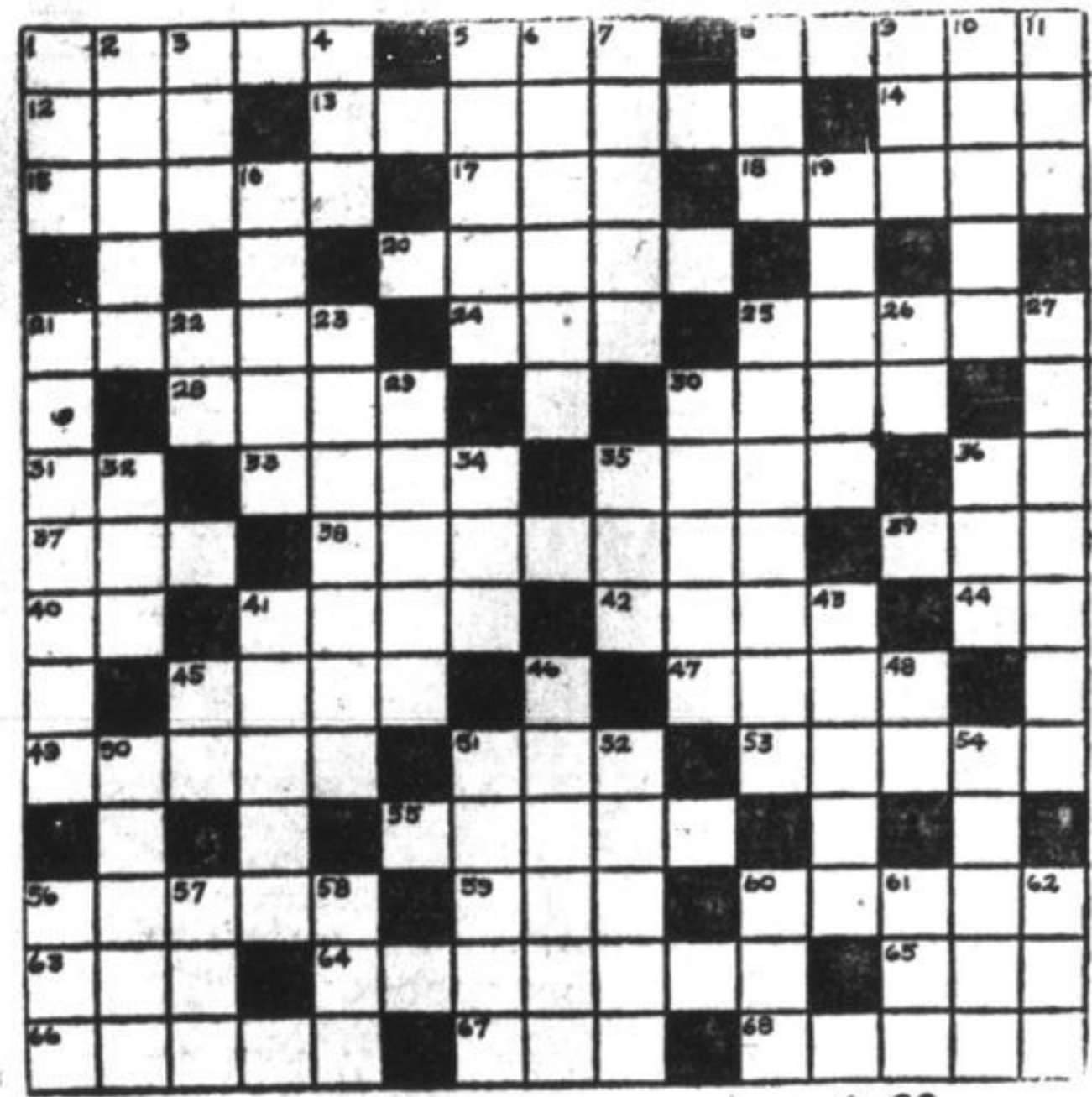


CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

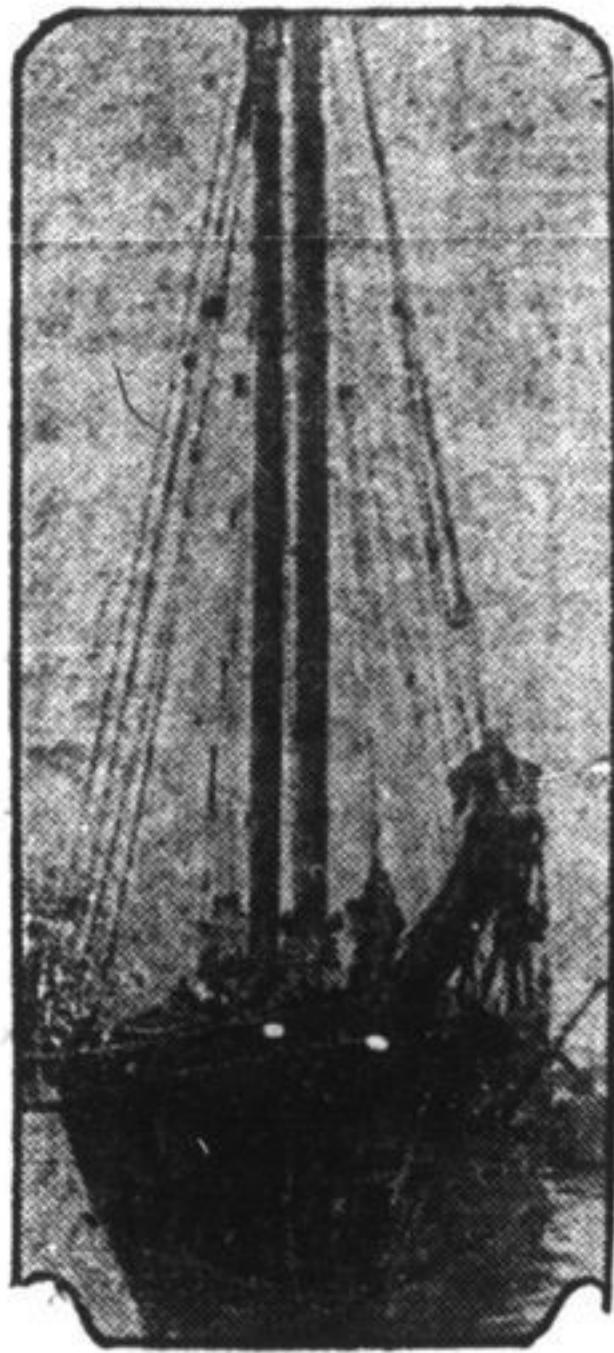
