A SCOTCH FAMILY GOES TO PITTSBURG

Brought Out Under British
Empire Settlement Scheme
—More Are Coming.

Another family brought to Canada under the British Empire Settlement scheme, arrived in the city on Monday afternoon, over the Canadian Pacific Railway and was placed with a Pittsburg farmer, E. N. Buckley, representative of the Soldier's Settlement Board, who is caring for the families when they arrive in Canada was at the C. P. R. station to greet the new settlers.

The family consisted of father, mother and three children who came from near Edinburgh. Under the scheme the families brought to this country are selected and must have had experience on the farm. When they arrive in Canada they are placed with experienced farmers for a period of one year, and then if they care to take a farm of their own they will be assisted.

The British and Canadian governments assist in paying the passage money which has to be refunded in three years and is paid in six installments. All those in the families over seventeen years pay full fare, while those under seventeen are carried free.

The dominion government supplies the land and the British government supplies an average of \$1,500 for each settler for stock and equipment, and the whole of the loan, from both governments is paid back in twenty-five years at a reasonable rate of interest.

Kingston has been made a distributing point for this district.

Two other families are being brought to the Kingston district and will arrive about the 10th of May. Two families arrived during April and were placed in Frontenac.

London, May 4.—In moving the second reading of the gold standard bill in the House of Commons this afternoon, Walter Guinness, financial secretary to the treasury, said two credits had been conditionally negotiated in connection with the stabilization of exchange. The first of these, Mr. Guinness stated, was with the Federal Bank, which has undertaken to give the Bank of England a revolving credit of \$200,000,000 for two years from May 10th, or the date of the British government's guarantee.
