ETTERS To The Editor

No Such By-law. Kingston, May 7 .- (To the Editor): I note in the Standard of May 6th the following:

"Speaking of the city council it is scarcely possible that its members realized the significance of their action in passing the by-law relating to the firs apparatus, prohibiting calls outside the municipality without a special arrangement being made with the municipality or institutions affected. This means, for example, that until some special arrangement is entered into the local fire department can not go to a call even to Mowat Sanatorium or Rockwood Hospital, to say nothing of the penitentiary. When one considers the great amount of money that these institutions leave in the city this seems to be a pretty drastic action quite apart from the apparent unneighborly and ungenerous spirit, which, of course, it may be taken for granted, the council never intended. No city can build a wall around itself and expect to prosper."

In reply I beg to say that no such by-law has been passed by the council, but why should the Standard call this drastic action, and yet in one month. its issue of March 13th, 1924, appears the following heading: 'Again PORCH OR PIAZZA CHAIR PAINT Wants Pen Moved.
